town of Lechate, Que., was completely isolated from telephone communication for several hours. Other lines between Montreal and Quebec, Sherbrooke, Richmond, Ottawa and other points were reported down. Telephone calls between Montreal and Toronto were rerouted through New York and long distance traffic staffs of the Bell Telephone Company were augmented during the day to cope with the situation. Company officials said more damage had been caused lines than by any other storm since 1933. About 900 homes were plunged into darkness in the west end of the city and repair crews of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power, Consolidated, worked overtime to repair the damage. The Montreal tramway company reported service disrupted in many sections of the city with many cars rerouted. Shipping on the St. Lawrence River below Three Rivers was brought almost to a standstill by heavy snow that made visibility poor and navigation dangerous.

Italy "a true act of hostility" and hinted such action might lead to withdrawal from the League. Germany Takes Action
Germany indirectly sided with sanctions by banning the export of important goods, including certain foodstuffs and raw materials for the iron, metallurgical and rubber industries. An official announcement, however, said "home necessity" was the reason. Italian scouts on the northern front reported nearly 250,000 Ethiopian troops would attempt to stop the Fascist advance southward. (By James A. Mills, Associated Press Foreign Staff)
ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 12—A bloody Ethiopian victory on the southern front, won at a heavy cost of lives on both sides, was officially claimed today by the government. It was a fight of age-old infantry against modern tank and machine gun units of the Fascist invaders, a communique said, and the former won. Despite a withering Italian fire, the announcement asserted, the tribesmen of Emperor Haile Selassie captured four Italian tanks in desperate fighting at Anelo, Ogaden Province. The battlefield was strewn with the dead of both armies. Ethiopia also claimed success in another clash in the same region. The government said its warriors killed six Italian officers and many soldiers, with the remainder fleeing in panic, and captured six trucks. The same communique reported a victory on the northern front. Commander Gabre Heyot, the communique continued, attacked a vastly superior Italian unit, killing the commander and a large number of soldiers and dispersing the enemy in Gedara.

GIRL HELD IN SLAYING

NEW YORK, Nov. 12—With a diamond engagement ring and a revolver in her purse, a pretty blond secretary was arrested on the fire escape of a swank east side apartment house today shortly after the body of her former employer was found in his bedroom. "Yes, I did it," police quoted her as saying. The victim was Dr. Fritz Gebhardt, 43 well-to-do German financier, industrialist and former professor of political economy at the University of Frankfurt. He had a wife, from whom he had been estranged for six months, and two children in Germany. The girl, found weeping on the fire escape, was Miss Vera Streets, 31 university graduate, substitute school teacher, and until recently, Dr. Gebhardt's secretary in his Fifth Avenue import-export firm. She told police she had been engaged to Dr. Gebhardt, and in the absence of any other motive she attributed the shooting tentatively to a quarrel between them. Four bullet wounds were in Dr. Gebhardt's body when it was found, clad in an old fashioned night shirt, in his 21st floor bedroom. Four empty shells were taken from Miss Streets' purse, police said, when they encountered her in the third floor fire escape. Two were in the revolver and two others lay on the floor.
