PREPARE FOR ARCTIC FLIGHT ON SATURDAY—Preparations are going forward for the final exercise of the first specialist navigators course that has been underway at the R.C. A.F. station, Summerside, for the past five and a half months. The members of this course who have journeyed to the United States and the United Kingdom in pursuit of navigational information will leave Summerside on Saturday, April 23, for two weeks flying in the Arctic. The first leg of the trip will be to Edmonton and on Sunday they will continue on to Whitehorse in the Yukon, which will serve as their base for two weeks. On May 7th they will return to Summerside non-stop, a distance of approximately 3,000 miles and their course will be finished. The nine members of the course are all veteran navigators and their course will qualify them to fill any navigation position in the R.C. A.F. or any other air force. The two weeks spent in the Arctic are to familiarize them with problems of Arctic flying and to give them valuable experience finding their way in polar regions where the ordinary magnetic compass is not reliable. This course lasts six months and only one is held every year. The members of the present course are: Sqdn. Ldr. N. Thorp, Vancouver; P.O. C.R. Cameron, Carlyle, Sask.; Flt. Lt. J.J. Therman, Moncton, N.B.; P.O. H.A. Smith, Summerside; Flt. Lt. G.L. Heide, Alliston, Ont.; Flt. Lt. L.M. MacLean, Calgary, Alta.; P.O. S.V. McKeague, Debec, N.B.; P.O. J.W. Whalen, Frankfort, Ont.; Captain W.R. Haughton, U.S.A.F., Los Angeles, California. The chief instructor of the course is Sqdn. Ldr. W.L. Gillespie of Toronto, who will be in command of the flight. The Summerside based Lancasters, Zenith and Polaris, will be used on this flight.
