DAVID BURKE, A. I. A., F. R. S. S. who was recently elected president of the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association, was born in Charlottetown, P. E. I., in 1850. After having received his education in the schools of the Island province, he entered the business of life insurance in Montreal, in 1880. He became engaged in the productive branch of the business almost immediately, and met with marked success. In 1883 Mr. Burke was appointed general manager of the New York Life Insurance Company in Canada, which company he had represented for many years previously, and which had retired from active operation in Canada in 1878. Besides being its general manager, he was one of the Canadian trustees of the New York Life, and the handsome building on Place d'Armes, which marked the advent of palatial office structures in this city, was the result of Mr. Burke's energies in that direction and added much to the development and success of that company's business in the Dominion. In 1897 Mr. Burke resigned the position of general manager of the New York Life to organize the Royal-Victoria Life with a million dollars of capital, having surrounded himself in this undertaking with a strong board of directors, all of whom are known throughout the length and breadth of the Dominion as exceptionally conservative and successful men of business. He is at present the general manager and a member of the board of directors of this company. Mr. Burke is an associate member of the Institute of Actuaries, and a Fellow of the Royal Statistical Society of Great Britain.—Montreal Witness.
