PATRIOTIC MEETING

A Representative Gathering Present.

NEARLY \$400 RAISED

An Active Committee Appointed to Carry on The Work.

The Patriotic Meeting held last night in the City Council chamber was not largely attended but was a representative gathering.

His Worship Mayor Warburton presided and His Honor Lieut.-Gov. McIntyre occupied a seat on the platform.

Among those present were: Bishop McDonald, Rev. James Simpson, Chief Justice Sullivan, Judge Warburton, Judge Reddin, Premier Farquharson, Attorney-General McKinnon, Col. Moore, F. de St. C. Brecken, Dr. Jenkins Dr. Beer, Geo. Hughes, Superintendent Sharp, W. A. Weeks, Councillor Crabbe Thomas May, Ennis McDonald, W. F. Carter, S. F. Hodgson, G. W. Wakeford, representatives of the press and a number of others. Lieut.-Gov. McIntyre opened the meeting by reading of two communications from the Governor General in reference to the establishing of a Canadian Patriotic Fund.

Bishop McDonald and Chief Justice Sullivan expressed themselves in sympathy with the movement and hoped that the giving would be as full and as cheerful as possible.

Premier Farquharson said that as far as the reaching of the different sections of the Province were concerned there is scarcely a home but what is included in a school district. Circulars are being prepared to be sent to each teacher. The showing of this province will be as good as any of the other provinces, and perhaps we will exceed the other province. The people of P. E. I. are very generous in giving. He hoped that every householder in the province would be reached, and that no person could say that he had not had an opportunity to give.

Dr. Jenkins thought enough publicity to the matter had not been given through the press. Meetings should be held in all the districts. There is no doubt P. E. Island will do handsomely.

Judge Warburton referred to the way subscriptions were raised during the St. John's fire. The farmers of the country are well off; but perhaps they have not got the ready cash. At that time the farmers gave grain which the railway shipped free of charge. No doubt if the same plan is followed the subscription will be much larger.

Dr. Beer thought that it would be better to appoint committees in the districts.
