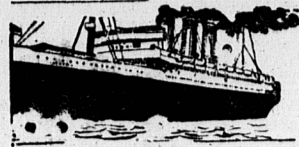

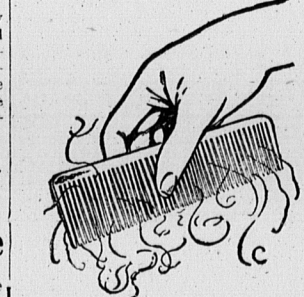

HINTS FOR The Motorist

NEEDS DASHBOARD CARBURETOR ADJUSTMENT



H. L. H. writes: After I start my engine and run the car a while the mixture becomes overrich and I have to stop and readjust the carburetor then, when the car is stopped for a time the mixture is so thin that I cannot start on it so I have to open the gasoline adjustment and undergo the same inconvenience again. Why is this and what is the remedy?

Answer: Your trouble comes from the poor quality of fuel in use and probably is aggravated by lack of sufficient heat applied to the intake air. We fancy from what you say that you have no strainer on the carburetor air and if this is the case, you better have one put on capable of being opened from the seat. Then you will be able to keep the carburetor adjusted for the best running mixture and choke the air to produce the necessary richness at starting. A dashboard adjustment on the carburetor itself would be still better, if you can attach one. Possibly it would pay to install a different carburetor, having dashboard adjustment, for it is almost impossible nowadays to operate without some such device.

REPAIRING OR EXCHANGING BATTERY



G. P. writes: My battery, which is not holding its charge was recently inspected and I was told that I needed a new one or needed new insulating material put in, which would cost \$18.00. Please tell me which to do. Is the old battery of any use?

Answer: If the plates are in good condition it will probably pay to have new separators put in but perhaps you would do better to exchange your old battery for a new one with the company that made it. The battery manufacturers offer fairly liberal exchange propositions in order to hold business. The risk in putting in new separators lies in the possibility that the plates are not good enough to warrant the outlay. Your old battery, unless exchanged is only valuable as junk.

TO AVOID PITCHING INNER TUBES



H. R. C. writes: Please tell me the correct way to insert inner tubes in casings so as to avoid pinching.

Answer: We presume that you are using straight-side casings and if this is the case you should not neglect to apply the "flap" or protector strip between the tube and the beads of the casing and take care that this lies evenly and does not catch the tube between it and the casing. A tube is not likely to become pinched if there is some air in it and it is well soapstoned when put in place. After casing is in place on the rim, it is a good idea to "work" it sideways on the rim with the hands or to bounce it on the floor, all the way round, in order to free the tube. It has become caught before inflation. Of course, a fabric break on the inside of a casing will pinch a tube and in case this defect exists it should be repaired.
