POPULATION ALL MEN.

There is a womanless republic on a peninsula south of Macedonia in Greece where 10,000 men live, studying and praying constantly, and where policemen and other persons guard the course to keep out women pilgrims and other persons who would make undesirable guests. Professor Caspar Reno Gregory, theologian of biblical manuscripts, who located in Kansas City recently at the Fine Arts Institute, told of this most unique of all countries.

"The place is Mount Athos, classic peninsula of Akte, the easternmost of three little peninsulas below Macedonia." Professor Gregory explained. "It is called Mount of the Twenty Monasteries, and was used in ancient times as a signalling station at Asia Minor. It is a real republic. There are 10,000 monks there, who govern themselves without interference from Turkey or any other country. There are, however, no government buildings, no president or other office-holders.

"The only police force is composed of men who patrol the coast to keep out women and men who have no permit to enter this most exclusive of countries. Only those who have a letter of permission from the Greek patriarch in Constantinople are allowed to enter the holy place. The holder of the letter must present it in Karges, the village capital of the peninsula."

Some reports have it, Professor Gregory said, that this republic was formed in the ninth century. It is said that the foot of woman has not touched the soil of the place for centuries. All the monks represent the Greek Catholic church. They work the soil some, but live chiefly upon contributions from pilgrims. Probably the greatest collection of biblical manuscripts is in the monasteries of this republic.—Kansas City Star.

The women, closely veiled and hooded, and herded like so many cattle within an iron grill, take no part in the proceedings which so intimately affect their futures, their interests being left in the hands of a voluble and gesticulative advocate. In each of the four sides of the great hall is an alcove, and in each alcove, seated cross legged on a many cushioned divan is a green robed, gold turbaned cad. To him the husband states his case, the wife, through her advocate, putting in her defence, if she has any. The judge considers the facts in silence, gravely stroking his long gray beard the while, and then delivers his decision, in nine cases out of ten in favor of the husband. Should either party be dissatisfied with the finding he or she can take an appeal by the simple process of walking across the hall and laying the case before one of the other judges, whose decision is final.

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to change the matter of an advertising nature. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to cover the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount-for-cash-with-order for advertising of churches & than for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for and all such there is but one reply—all items etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Veras accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.
