Rome is paying its streets, laying new gas and water pipes, enlarging its hotels. Issuing advertisements to all the world (the English version of which is regrettably incorrect), running a newspaper, doing up the Baths of Diocletian and The Castel S. Angelo, laying new railway tracks (all for the Exhibition).

There are homes building to accommodate 10,000 families, four enormous new Ministries, zoological gardens with wonderful and ingenious rocks built out of wood-work, wire netting and stucco, which are really a triumph of architecture, if business and some say hardly in keeping with the Villa Borghese in which the gardens are placed.

The grandiose Victor Emmanuel Monument will be completed, it is thought, in 1911. Enormous bronze pieces of horse and man are being transported to the spot to form the equestrian statue.

There are three new bridges building, new gasworks, a new stadium, and a passeggiata, archaeological, a boulevard about 200 yards wide stretching from the Palatine to the Baths at Caracalla. All classes of employes, railwaymen, tramwaymen, postmen, municipal servants, are having special lodging-houses built to accommodate them.

straight ahead and right on a level with your eyes, and observe the poise of the chin. Walking about your room with a book balancing itself steadily on your head is good practice. When the chin is held up properly, the chest is naturally raised, the shoulder drawn back and the whole carriage improved.

A habit of keeping the chin up also wards off the encroachment of a tendency to a double chin. Letting the chin sink tends to make the set of the jaws hard-looking, and the muscles of the mouth and cheeks to sag.

By no means the least important effect of a well-poised chin and head erect is that one breathes better, and takes in deeper draughts of air.

REDNESS OF NOSE IN WINTER. There is no minor affliction more trying to the girl who has it than redness of the nose. The undesirable degree of color may have one of several causes. Indigestion or the wrong kind of diet, is not seldom responsible, or it may come from inflammation of the mucous membrane of the nose itself. It may come from wearing a veil too frequently and too tightly, from cold ankles or cold feet, or a generally sluggish circulation of the blood. Of course tight corsets or any stricture around the body will cause the nose to get red. Women frequently get red noses and bluish complexions despite the fact that they are wearing heavy wraps around their necks, because they have not enough underclothing on and the vital organs as well as the lower limbs are not sufficiently protected. This is especially true this season, when frocks are too scanty to allow of warm petticoats.

A cold bath at night, followed by a brisk rub with toilet water containing alcohol, will sometimes cure a red nose. Facial massage and inhalations of salt water are also beneficial. Exercise and a careful regulation of the diet are essential.

will give Canada money to burn, but the fire will also consume Canada's sweet and powerful independence, her national integrity, those traditions of British connection, which have been the source of her strength, her commercial and financial freedom and her opportunities for organic union with the Empire.

"Imperial union is now a far off event. The only hope is that smaller individuals, conflicting commercial, industrial and agricultural interests in the States, would prevent the larger political design and stop the ratification of the agreement.

"The agreement will eventually mean that the Canadians have lost their grip of their own independence. Under this agreement the United States seeks control of the great Dominion."

Sir Gilbert also referred to the strong opposition by Sir John A. Macdonald and Edward Blake some twenty years ago to commercial union with the United States, because that would mean political union.

Lord Strathcona says that the arrangement seems to be a mutual one. "Neither country can reap any benefit at the expense of the other," he said.

THE USEFUL 'LITTLE' FROCK.

In recent seasons there has been an effort among manufacturers of frock clothing to provide ready-made what women usually call simple little street frocks. These are not of the elaborate type, but merely frocks of simple lines and of moderate cost, such as a woman likes to have for ordinary street wear or for small informal social affairs.

It must be admitted that as a rule the ready-made frocks of this class leave something to be desired. The designers, instead of clinging to simplicity of line and detail and trusting to the color and texture to be obtained even in many inexpensive materials for the success of the frock, attempt shoddy imitations of the more costly and better results for less money if one can have frocks of this character made by a fairly skilled dressmaker whose prices are reasonable. There is always that 'if.'

At this season of the year a frock of this type is a good investment, for one's winter things are beginning to show wear and tear, although there are still over two months and a half of winter weather, when such a costume as this may be worn with comfort.

The shops are full of bargains now in materials suitable for these frocks. The usual choice of the manufacturer is the light weight French serge or cloth or satin finished woolsens, and similar stuffs that will make useful and attractive street frocks of this type. The usual trimmings are soutache braiding, velvet or satin.

As for the girl who wears low shoes in winter, a red nose is merely the natural consequence of this folly. She should not take long to choose between footwear that protects her ankles from cold and damp, and a continuation of the disfiguring color, bands and wide bands of silk braid.

A good model for one of these 'little' frocks is of fine French navy blue serge, trimmed with bands of black satin. A new touch is given to the blouse by a large sailor collar of satin opening over a chemisette of tucked chiffon, and there are undersleeves also of chiffon.

The embroidered band trimmings, which one can sometimes find going at half price in this month of sales, can be utilized with excellent effect on simple frock, provided one is careful to put the right tints together. A frock of sage green cashmere, perfectly plain and simple, with a shallow yoke and deep undercollar of dotted net is given a note of real distinction by embroidered trimming bands in shades of green just touched with old rose and gold, applied around the yoke outline, on the cuffs and as a girle.

CONFESSED TO SCORES OF MURDERS

The recent sensational trials of Mme. Steinheil in Paris for the murder of her husband, and of Countess Maria Tarnowski in Vienna for complicity in the assassination of her affianced. It may be mentioned that Countess Tarnowski is a cousin of Count de Lacy.

The trial is attracting great crowds, and besides the two principals, the names of the mistress of the doctor, who is a woman in high Russian society, and the male cousin of the Count, who expected to benefit financially by the murder, are mentioned.

Dr. Pantchenko has confessed that he committed the murder. In fact, he admits that he was a professional wholesale murderer. Wives who wished to be rid of their husbands and impecunious persons who were anxious to benefit by the death of rich relatives were his customers. He acknowledged that he had committed scores of murders of this kind. Chief Philpoff, of the Russian secret police, says he has traced a series of amazing crimes to the man. The accused says that he committed the Boturlin murder while under the hypnotic influence of Count deLacy. The Count denies all of the doctor's statements.

Baron Vashill Boturlin was the wealthy Russian. DeLacy's wife was his sister. The eldest son of General Boturlin had offended his father by marrying a music hall dancer, and it was known that Baron Vashill would inherit all his father's wealth, estimated at \$4,000,000. If the Baron died this money would go to Countess deLacy. For the murder of the Baron, deLacy promised to give him \$200,000.

TWO CHILDREN SUFFOCATED

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.—Mrs. George Marlow went to a moving picture show last night leaving her two children, Donald and Anne, six and seven years old, in a flat. Boys noticed smoke pouring from the windows and summoned the firemen. A few dashes of water extinguished the blaze. But the children had taken refuge in a cupboard, and were both dead when the firemen managed to gain access.
