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Sees Prospects For Bumper Potato And Grain Crop

Making allowance for the fact that "anything can happen within the next few weeks," the present prospects for a big potato crop and bumper grain harvest in the Province were excellent.

Mr. Traylor said that the recent rain had done wonders, especially in the drier sections of the Province; that the grain was filling well; that very little blight, and that only in two or three small areas, had made its appearance so far.

Commenting on the prospects for good crops for the potato crop, Mr. Traylor said no one in the Province had any accurate forecast at this time.

Mr. Traylor said one of the drawbacks of the Island potato grower is the practice of using so many growers to sell themselves "short".

Commenting on the hay crop, Mr. Traylor said it was not an average crop, principally owing to the fact that much of the clover had been winter killed due to the lack of snow and the consequent thawing and freezing with the resultant breaking of the clover roots.

Mr. Traylor said the turnip crop should be better than average. Quoted on the report that Boston prices were now \$125 per bushel and that a Victoria firm was shipping three cars to that market next week.

Passage of the resolution, sponsored by the United States and amended by the French and Poles, also served to give security Council recognition to the republic of Indonesia. The question immediately arose whether the Netherlands would choose to comply with the Council decision. Dr. Bello N Van Kieftens, Dutch ambassador, told the Council in the midst of the speedy discussions that his Government would accept an invitation to end hostilities but would oppose any order for the Indonesian issue. The Dutch consistently held that the Council had no power to give any orders in the Indonesian case. Meanwhile in Washington a State Department spokesman said that the United States had offered its "good offices" rather than mediation in an effort to settle the Indonesian issue. The Dutch had no official explanation of just what the United States proposed as a means of ending the fighting. Since the United States offer was made in the Council, delegates generally have referred to it as "mediation."

WORLD TALK LONDON - (CP) - More than 2,000 representatives of 50 countries have come to Britain for the Commonwealth Heads of State Conference.
