with a thin covering of cement, in order to transport wheat, the paper states. Special provision would be made for carrying livestock on deck. Although Russia is one of the world's leading producers of wheat, she is importing this commodity through Vladivostok and may have to supply certain requirements of her northwestern territory by way of the Baltic ports.

"Considerable interest has been aroused in the report that Churchill will experience unexpected activity should negotiations between Canada and the Soviet for the exchange of cattle and wheat for petroleum be concluded satisfactorily," the Gazette goes on.

"It is learned on good authority that Winnipeg interests proposed shipping livestock to Russia via the Hudson Bay route, taking in return both oil and anthracite coal... provided the Canadian Government would permit this fuel (coal) to enter the Dominion again.

"Two strong arguments are offered in opposition to this import proposition. A large proportion of the wells in the Turner Valley oil fields are "capped" at the present time, the market for gasoline and other products of petroleum being limited throughout the west at the moment. The importation of oil and gasoline through Churchill would immediately raise severe competition for this natural Canadian product.

PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) **MONTEAL**, Dec. 27.—Strength in storage eggs and eagerness in potatoes were sale price movements on the produce and dairy market here today.

Storage eggs in cartons or less advanced half a cent while retailers were up on two cents. Light offerings in addition to steady sales to the United States during the past few weeks were the main factors in the return. In cartons or less storage eggs were quoted at 21 1/2 to 22 1/2 cents for firsts and 20 cents and 18 to 18 1/2 cents a dozen. To retailers, in cartons, storage eggs and firsts both gained a cent.

Butter held unchanged at 21 1/2 to 22 cents a pound for no 1 firsts. Cheese made with early western milk was 28 to 29 cents and 24 to 25 cents, respectively, while second was up two cents at 21 to 22 cents. Fresh eggs in cartons or less held steady at 31 to 32 cents for firsts and 29 to 30 cents for second. Receipts were 700 cases.

Financial Problems

Mr. Bennett's return will be the occasion for renewed attention to financial problems, which never subside.

For the past year and a half particularly, these have been the dominant activity of the Government, which has been providing, in addition to all normal necessities money for relief of unemployment, for the relief of provinces in financial difficulties, for the relief of the railways, and for other things in which default would occasion hardship and imperil public credit. The necessity continues. Perhaps 90 out of every 100 orders in council which are passed has some financial significance. The situation demands a rigid scrutiny of public expenditures and outlays and also of available sources of revenue, how they are functioning and what enlargement may be expedient without the frustration of industry. The great problem of the day consists in devising ways and means of placing the financial solvency of the country beyond the possibility of relapse and while of course it can and will be done, it is said here the taste calls for exceptional fore-sight and ingenuity.

Immediate attention will also be directed to the Dominion-Provincial Conference in the middle of January. While the program is not
