THE TURKS IN SYRIA

"The Turks, thinking it expedient to apply their Armenian policy to Syria, devised a slower but equally effective scheme of extermination which an English mission worker in Syria, "They tried it first on the Lebanon, where the population was largely Christian. They created an artificial famine, and starvation soon began to do its deadly work. This artificial famine has now been extended to the whole of Syria, and has carried off tens of thousands of Moslems and Christians alike."

"It has been said that if the country remains another six months under the control of Turkey the whole population will be in their graves. Already whole villages are left without an inhabitant. The sufferings which the people have passed through have had the effect of changing their naturally religious temperament, and it is said that now no one goes to church or mosque. They are being overtaken by madness or melancholia."

CONVEYOR AND FAN COMBINED IN SNOWPLOW

By combining an endless conveyor with a powerful rotary fan, an inventor claims to have constructed a railroad snowplow that will clear a track of snow of almost any depth, or a mixture of snow and debris, such as results from a slide on a mountain slope. The February Popular Mechanics in an illustrated article. The machine is built on trucks, is operated by its own engine, and is propelled from behind by a locomotive. The endless conveyor is mounted slantingly at the front, with the forward end to the ground. As the plow advances, the nose is driven into the snow, which is steadily cut away by the conveyor and discharged into a hood containing the fan, at the upper end of the incline. The fan throws the snow either side of the track, its delivery being regulated by the position of the sides of the hood, which are adjustable.

CONTINUED BRITISH SUCCESSSES

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Major General Frederick H. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the British war office, said today that there had been no developments on the western front during the past fortnight to indicate that the German offensive was near. One of the most satisfactory features of the work of the two weeks in the west had been the continued British success in the air, which had great importance as the preliminary to any battle. General Maurice added that the British air-predominance hampered the enemy tremendously in gaining information which was required by him before the commencement of any important battle.

With regard to Palestine, Gen. Maurice said the developments of the past week offered a promising field for further development.

"General Allenby," he said, "has advanced to Jericho and now stands on the last main ridge overlooking the valley of the river Jordan."

Since January 1, Gen. Maurice said, the Germans had carried out five air raids on England, of which two were abortive. During the same period the British carried out thirteen raids into Germany, all of which had definite results.

Discussing the efforts of the Germans to have the Geneva convention arranged for a discontinuance of the use of poisonous gas, Gen. Maurice asserted that the Entente would be glad to give up this gas if it were possible to get any guarantee that Germany would be bound by any promise or agreement to do likewise.
