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### Borden Arranges For Temporary School Building

Borden school trustees hope to obtain a former bunkhouse for use as a temporary school. It was learned last night. The five-room Borden school was badly damaged by fire late Tuesday. Only one room was left intact.

Trustees examined the damaged school yesterday and decided that nothing could be done about repairing or rebuilding until spring. They then decided to attempt to rent the former Foundation Maritime bunkhouse here, a one-story building 30 by 100 feet. Plans are to partition it off into five classrooms and heat each with a stove.

It was understood the bunkhouse, used during work at the ferry piers, has been purchased by Wendell McWilliams and others of Carleton but several of the new owners were reported to have been contacted and were said agreeable to renting to the school board. The remainder of the group will probably be contacted today. The trustees said they hoped to have classes for the town's 150 pupils resumed by Monday.

In the old school, the latest classroom, which opened this week, was the one least damaged in Tuesday night's fire. The other room saved was almost a total wreck from water and smoke.

### Mr. W. M. Mellish Named To Commerce Chamber Committee

Mr. W. M. Mellish, manager of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, has been advised by Don Morrell of Montreal, executive secretary of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce that he has been appointed a member of the Chamber's Maritime regional committee by the board of directors at their annual meeting held recently in Vancouver. Last year Mr. Mellish, who is a past president of the Summerside Board of Trade, was a member of the national council of the Chamber working principally on new memberships. Prince Edward Island was the first Province to go over its membership quota and it is hoped to further increase the memberships in the Chamber from this Province this year. The Maritime committee to which Mr. Mellish has now been appointed meets two or three times a year.

### Library Group At O'Leary

—On Thursday night, Nov. 18th there was a special meeting in the Verdun Theatre in O'Leary, in the interests of the O'Leary Library which for a number of years has been housed in the Orange Lodge building. It has recently been learned that there is a possibility of the Library having to vacate its quarters. In such an event it will be necessary to obtain other quarters or lose the Library entirely. That was the purpose of the meeting on Thursday night. At a previous public meeting held in the Library room a small committee was formed consisting of Rev. W.G. Dickson, chairman; Mr. John Field, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia; Mrs. E. W. Turner, Mrs. Fred Champlin and Mrs. John Matthews.

The committee through its chairman presented a number of resolutions recommending that a committee be appointed to investigate cost of the building a new library or else purchasing the present building and renovating it for library purposes. The genial and efficient chairman, Mr. Peter N. Paté, who kept everything moving at a brisk pace and by his wit and humor kept the audience in a happy frame of mind appointed the following committee: Rev. W.G. Dickson, Rev. C. O. Howlett, Dr. George Dewar, Mr. A. J. Matheson, Mrs. E. W. Turner and Mrs. Fred Champlin and this committee has to report to another public meeting on or before Dec. 15th.

On behalf of his committee, Rev. Mr. Dickson also moved that the fee for the library books for children be increased from 10c a year to 25c and for adults from 25c to 50c. This was adopted by the meeting. The meeting also approved another recommendation of the special committee that a concert be held in the near future for library purposes in which the nearby schools will be asked to supply one act plays or other suitable numbers in conjunction with the O'Leary school and the proceeds would be for the library's purposes including light, fuel, etc. The meeting also went on record as favoring the installation of electric light in the present building housing the library. The Library served a constituency consisting of twenty-eight school sections besides the village of O'Leary. Letters and circulars had gone out to all the schools in the district, to all the clergy, to all the Women's Institute and to many interested individuals telling about the committee's work. The response was disappointing, there being only a small number present.

A fine address on the work of the National Film Board was given by the Provincial Representative, Mr. S.M. MacInnis of Charlottetown. Mr. MacInnis spoke about a Film Council which would have to be formed consisting of one member from all the groups in the district, one from each Young Peoples Union, one from each Co-op society, one from the Legion, one from the schools, etc. It was moved and seconded that such a committee be formed and report later to Mr. Chandler of Charlottetown, supervisor of the Libraries for P.E.I. or to Mr. MacInnis.

Then Mr. MacInnis showed fine moving pictures, one dealing with Libraries and one entitled "Fitness is a family affair" which showed the need of recreational facilities for boys and girls and youth and also for older folk and how those needs could be met. The meeting thanked Mr. MacInnis for his splendid address and fine educational films and also thanked Mr. Finemerson Smallman for the use of his fine new theatre.
