

Germany Pleads For Lenient Treatment

BRUSSELS, Dec. 17.—The economic committee of five of the principal allied powers and Germany met at the conference table here today in the first of a series of meetings which will go far towards determining what Germany must pay for war reparations. The German representatives gave an impression of being on the defensive. The German delegation is composed of 27 delegates headed by Sigmond Bergmann, Rudolf Havenstein. The president of the Reich bank replaced Karl F. Von Siemens. The morning session was occupied with a depiction by Herr Schroeder, Germany Under Secretary of Finance, of Germany's economic situation and the condition of her budget. He painted the outlook in the darkest colors and said he hoped the allies would not "put the knife to Germany's throat," thus reducing her to Austria's situation.

Rescued After Thrilling Experience

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Dec. 16.—Deliverance came today to the Portuguese packet Serina, which had tugged at her anchors through the night almost on the Dumping Rock, off the Dartmouth shore, while her crew pumped for their lives to keep out a rush of water and sixty-four passengers huddled in the hold on their knees in prayer. Her bowsprit was broken, the foremast split and her sails were torn to shreds by the gale before a tugboat poked past the rocks this morning and towed her here. Captain Joaquim Duarte, the youthful skipper of the little craft, when he reached the dock, offered up thanks for the delivery of his passengers and crew, saying it was a miracle that they were saved after a night in which the roar of the gale and the boom of the surf on the ship's sides and on the nearby rocks carried a constant threat.


The ship which was formerly the Whaler Bertha D. Nickerson, was bound from the Cape Verde Islands for New Bedford. Captain Durate stood his little ninety-ton ship with 99 men aboard in for this port yesterday, but was blown off his course by the storm and was forced to anchor almost on the verge of the Dumping Rocks. It was a perilous place and coast guards sought to save those aboard but it was late at night before they could reach the schooner's side. Then they stood by while tugs that tried to tow the Serina clear were unable today to get alongside.

Baseball Season To Open April 13

National League Decides to Recommend That Date—American League Players in New York and Boston Traded

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—The New York and Boston clubs of the American League today completed a trade involving eight players, Catcher "Muddy" Ruell, pitcher Herb Thormahlen, second baseman "Del" Pratt and outfielder Sam Vick of the Yankees, go to the Red Sox in exchange for catcher Wally Schang, pitchers Harry Harper and Waite Hoyt and infielder Mike McNally.

The trade was engineered by Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Harry Frazee, presidents of the New York and Boston clubs, respectively. They announced that no money was involved in the transaction. Both clubs assume the responsibility of signing the players.

Manager Huggins of the Yanks said the deal was made primarily for the purpose of giving each club a player that both were badly in need of. Boston wanted a second baseman and got Pratt, while New York needed an experienced left-hand pitcher, and got Harper.

The trade of pitcher Rubby Morgan of Brooklyn for pitcher Walter Ruether of Cincinnati, the only other deal involving players consummated during the week, was announced shortly after the National League at its meeting. It is known that there was no desire on the part of the league to further punish Morgan because of his alleged ticket scalping during the last world series. Discussion of that case and the recommendation that Royal Irish Constabulary, each of whom said he had resigned, as a protest against British misrule, appeared before the Committee of One Hundred and gave evidence of raids which they said they had been forced to participate in or orders from British commanders to destroy life and property. One of the men, Caddam, declared he had seen men, women and children dragged from their beds amid showers of bullets to watch their homes burn.

The attention of Sir Hamar Greenwood, Chief Secretary for Ireland, in Lloyd George's cabinet was called to this evidence by Richard H. McDonald, of Ottawa, secretary of the Orange Forward Movement, and the record of these men asked for. This evening Mr. McDonald received a memorandum from the Chief Secretary for Ireland, reading as follows:—

"Have you telegram of the 11th inst. As far as we know no ex-Royal Irish Constabulary men have applied for passports to America to give evidence before Washington committee. There may be ex-Royal Irish Constabulary men living in the United States of America, but none of them have any authority to speak for this episode and loyal force."
