Goodwill whose address on Missions must have appealed to every Christian worker present. The offering received was thirty-five dollars and seventy-five cents (\$35.75).

SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND.—The 48th closing exercises of the Halifax School for the Blind held in the Assembly Hall of the School Monday evening proved most interesting. Long before the exercises were opened the hall and balconies were taxed and many had to remain in the corridor. Mr. Charles Archibald, President of the Board of Management, in opening the exercises, spoke of the present closing and said the past year had been as good as previous splendid musical programme was rendered by the pupils, and band of the school. At the conclusion of the programme Mr. Justice Harris presented the graduates, numbering sixteen with their diplomas, and distributed the prizes. A hospital is at present being built to look after the maimed soldiers who return from the war, but how about those who lose their sight in the battle? Two men who had done all they could for their King and Country were now at the school, and the school was prepared to receive any others who return and are suffering from the loss of their eyesight. A man may lose a hand or a foot and still be able to carry on his vocation, but when a man is deprived of his sight, it is a very serious thing, said the speaker, Sir Frederick Fraser, in closing said he believed the work of training such men should be developed.

STILL 105th.—The question was asked one day, "Why the '105th Comfort Circle'?" The name "105th Comfort Circle" is decidedly the most appropriate name that could have been chosen and shows not only good taste, but sound common sense. The object of this Circle as everyone is now aware, is to provide comforts for the boys of the original 105th Battalion as well as the two drafts just sent from this province as reinforcements. The 105th P. E. I. Battalion was broken up, and it is the Circle's aim—to preserve the name, and provide some comforts for these same boys who are now in the 13th, 14th, 25th, 38th, 104th and 13th (Reserve) Battalions, besides a few of the men who have been transferred to other units. Nearly 400 of the 105th boys transferred to the first three mentioned regiments have now been fighting in the trenches for six months. Less than thirty-six per cent of the 105th boys are in the 104th, awaiting orders to proceed to France. Only a short time ago several were drafted from the 13th Reserve to the now famous "Fighting 28th" and the remainder may be called upon at any moment to reinforce the boys at the front. Perhaps the following extract from a letter written by one of the best of the 105th officers, fully voices the sentiment of the great majority of old 105th boys. In the different units: "The number and name of the old battalion is still dear to many of us here, as it is to all those at home, and I am sure that all regret that it could not go to France as a unit to represent our Island Province."
