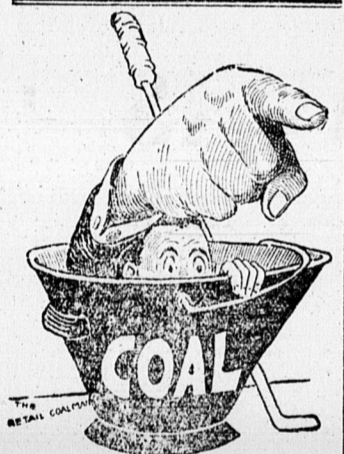

MESSRS. BORDEN AND HAZEN HERE TONIGHT.

Robert Laird Borden, leader of the Opposition in Canada, and J. Douglas Hazen, Premier of the New Brunswick Government, are now in this Province and will give public addresses in this city tonight. The Guardian and our citizens generally extend to them a cordial welcome and will listen to what they have to say with genuine interest. In point of ability, character and knowledge of public affairs both these gentlemen stand in the front rank of the great Conservative party of Canada.

Mr. Borden has held a seat in the House of Commons since 1896. Five years after his first election he was chosen leader of the Conservative party in Canada, which was rapid promotion. He is much respected on both sides of the House and throughout Canada. Mr. Hazen was first elected to the House of Commons for St. John, in 1891. Later he turned his attention to Provincial affairs, was elected to the Legislature in 1899 and in the same year was called to lead the Opposition in that body. This also was rapid promotion. At the election of 1908 he led his party to victory capturing two-thirds of the seats in the Legislature, and formed a strong Government which he has since led with conspicuous ability.

Both Mr. Borden and Mr. Hazen are lawyers, both are in the prime of life—in the fifties—both are endowed with robust health, good presence and excellent social qualities, backed in each case with a considerable property.

PROHIBITION IN MAINE.

This is an exciting season in the border State of Maine, the last week in the great struggle for and against prohibition before the polling on Monday next. Maine adopted prohibition sixty years ago in 1851. From that time to the present the law has withstood many onsets of the liquor party made to secure its repeal. Years ago the law was strengthened in its position by being made a part of the State constitution, and was so placed beyond the power of the Legislature to repeal it. The effort is now being made to amend the constitution by popular vote by eliminating the prohibition article.

The campaign is reported to be more exciting than a political election, the Republicans being mainly for and the Democrats against prohibition, but with many on both sides who will vote independently. Nearly all the men who first voted for prohibition in Maine are now dead, and since then the population of the State has increased by fifty per cent. The law has suffered from non-enforcement in some sections and has suffered from being made the football of party. Both the friend and opponents of prohibition profess themselves confident of obtaining a majority on Monday. If the prohibitionists win, as is hoped, the law will remain on the statute book and in the constitution. If the victory falls to the other side, the State will return to the license column. The doubt as to the result arises from the considerable foreign vote in the manufacturing cities and towns.

CHEMICAL FIRE ENGINES.

There is great need of one or two chemical fire engines in connection with the otherwise excellent fire department in this city. The desirability and utility of the chemical engine is recognized in all cities of the civilized world. It is light, portable and more useful than any other in quickly extinguishing incipient fires in confined spaces, or where the fire is difficult to get at. In the recent fire at the Telephone head office a chemical engine would have been exactly what was wanted.

Our firemen are prompt and efficient in action, the pride of our own and the envy of other cities in that regard. They should be equipped with all the best modern appliances. A chemical engine added to the present outfit would easily save to our citizens many times its cost in a few years, and might in some cases prevent an incipient blaze becoming a serious conflagration.

NOTES.

Will Mr. Borden tell us tonight that if he comes to power he will promptly settle for us the transportation question in terms of justice, and equality towards our producers and shippers?

The Patriot intimates that the three short haul rate will now receive the attention of the Government and will be brought before the Managing Board of the Government Railways for adjustment. No time should be lost in this vital matter which has been the cause of bitter and continued complaint for so many years.

The Examiner tells about thousands of dozens of eggs imported to Canada. As a matter of fact The Guardian printed the figures of the imports and exports of eggs in advance of any other newspaper here, when The Examiner was still in

very much in their favor. They are strongly opposed to the trade agreement and come here to speak against it. Those who share their views will be specially pleased to hear them. Those who are still in doubt after hearing Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Fielding, will be interested to hear the Opposition side ably and plausibly presented. Convinced supporters of reciprocity will want to hear them, if only to be able to point out afterward where their logic may be weak and their arguments unconvincing.

All should be interested to hear Mr. Borden especially for another reason. He is leader of a party which will one day rule Canada again, whether that be soon or late. It is morally certain if reciprocity should by any chance be defeated—which we do not anticipate—that Mr. Borden will very shortly be Premier of Canada. But whether he shall win or lose in the election of two weeks hence we greatly desire his help and that of the great party he leads to urge upon the Parliament of Canada the need of better transportation and reasonable freight rates for this Province. The Ministers who visited us lately were strangely silent on that vital subject. We sincerely hope that Mr. Borden will be less reticent, and we assure him that anything he may have to say in regard thereto will be heard with as close interest as anything he can say about reciprocity.

about whether to support or oppose a trade agreement. Consumers of eggs in this city have for years past been paying the full food value of all the eggs they have consumed and will robably continue to do so whether the three cents per dozen of Canadian duty remains or is taken off. It is a tax on food, and consequently obnoxious. Nobody contends that reciprocity will raise the price of eggs. Obviously the producer will get less times and on the average, but here he loses dimes on eggs we doubt not he will gain quarters or dollars on other farm products without materially increasing the cost of living to non-producing consumers. (The Examiner can convince our people that reciprocity will make eggs cheaper it will by so much commend the trade agreement to their favorable consideration.)

Who is Disloyal ?

Many advocates of trade obstruction talk as if there was something treasonable in dealing with the people of the United States. The rabid Conservative in eastern Ontario who said on Mr. Borden's platform that he would have no truck nor trade with the Yankees typifies this narrow, little Canadian spirit. It would have some excuse if the United States were not now the largest trader Canada has. Few people realize that we already do a million and quarter dollars' trade with the United States for every working day in the year. Is Canada any less loyal for the enormous growth of this commerce in the last twenty years? On the contrary, whatever inclination ever existed towards an exaction has completely disappeared.

But what of the men who are buying millions of dollars of goods from the United States every year? Some of them are amongst the most pronounced of Imperialists in sentiment. With one hand they buy from the United States what they need in their business while with the other they wave the flag that keeps alive the British spirit, and incidentally maintains the high protective tariff.

What manufacturer in Toronto but uses coal in his business? and American coal at that? Over \$31,000,000 worth of it came to Canada last year.

The cotton combine which is so highly protected against outside competition, brought in \$11,000,000 of raw cotton from the United States last year.

It is surely not disloyal for Mr. A. E. Kemp, the moving spirit in the tinware combine, to buy tin plate in the United States, and to place his insurance there. Mr. Kemp moved heaven and earth to prevent a duty being imposed on his raw material a few years ago, when a projected factory at Morrisburg sought that advantage, on the plea that it would mean a new industry for Canada.

Mr. Edward Gurney is still a loyalist, and an advocate of a tariff wall "as high as Hangman's gallows"—for the other fellow—so long as he and other manufacturers may bring in \$2,266,000 worth of pig iron in a year. Mr. Gurney is still loyal, though he has a large branch factory in New England.

Even the Ontario Government are loyal, though in calling for tenders for a public building they specify Georgia pine as a necessity. Sir Edmund Walker and Mr. E.B. Osler are ardent citizens of the Empire, though Sir Edmund's bank has many American branches, and Mr. Osler is a director of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which has 3,900 miles of lines in the Republic, and profits even by the abhorred north and south haul.

All this is legitimate and as it should be, for it has built up an important trade of \$284,000,000 worth of things that Canadians want. But when these men and others say the farmers have no right to sell their products to the United States if the people of that country want them, for fear of compromising the loyalty of this country, they are talking what reasonable men will refuse to believe.

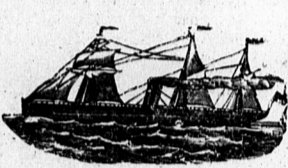
