## Mixup May Occur When Time Changes

Daylight Saving Time is scheduled to come into effect on Thursday and one minute after residents of the City will shift their time one hour ahead according to the ruling of the Council.

A petition was presented to the Council at the last regular meeting containing 226 names asking that the new time be adopted. Another petition was also presented at the same time containing 93 names asking for a change from the present Standard Time system. In both petitions the names attached were from among the leading business houses in the City.

Since then a number of firms in the City have notified the public that they would continue to do business by adhering to Standard Time despite the ruling of the Council while others have agreed to conform with the law.

A casual check yesterday about the City indicates a major mixup when the new time is inaugurated as many offices signified their intentions of remaining on Standard Time.

At the Post Office despatch and receipt of mails will be made in accordance with the Railway time table but the time of opening and closing the wickets at the Post Office will conform with the decision of the municipal authorities. At the railway the train schedule will be run by Standard Time but the offices will be on Daylight Saving Time.

City churches will adopt the new time and services Sunday will be according to Daylight Saving Time. At least one large hotel in Charlottetown intends to stay by standard time unless compelled to shift for the convenience of travellers. Several others will operate on the new time.

It was not known last night what action would be taken by the City School Board until a special meeting to discuss the matter is held this week. Prince of Wales College have made no definite arrangements concerning the change but announce they will follow the majority.

All the City banks will operate on Daylight Saving Time, it was learned.

The Canadian Airways planes will continue to follow Standard Time in their flights.

Bus operating between the City and outside points will be adhering to Standard Time but will leave here for their destination according to Daylight Saving Time by shifting the time of leaving ahead one hour.

At least one large restaurant has announced that Standard Time would be followed during this summer.

ROAD WORK NEGLECTED.—Complaints have been received with regard to the neglected condition of the West River Road from Rocky Point eastward. The result is serious inconvenience to the travelling public. Ruts and holes have been left unattended to the extent that one of two which effected if the road had been dragged immediately after the recent rains.

NEW AIRWAYS PLANE.—The new Canadian Airways plane which was seen circling over the City this week is the latest model of a retractable undercarriage and is fully equipped with radio for beam flying. It carries 6 passengers and 2 pilots. It is one of two machines in the Maritimes. It is not expected that this machine will be used on the Charlottetown-Moncton route.

TIME CHANGES AT POST OFFICE.—The inauguration of Daylight Saving will result in an adjustment of the hours of closing of the various despatches of mail. It is necessary in all cases that despatch receipt of mails be made in accordance with the Railway time tables but the time of the opening and closing of the wickets at the Post Office will conform to the decision of the municipal authorities to observe Daylight Saving Time. Commencing on May 21st, the time of closing of the first despatch will be 12:45 a. m. Standard Time to 12:45 p. m. Daylight Saving Time and that of the other despatches to conform with the Railway time tables.

MONEY TAKEN FROM BOY.—City Police last night apprehended two juveniles who had relieved another youngster of a five-dollar bill which his mother had given him for purchases at the store. At 8 p. m. the juvenile in question gave her 10-year-old son \$5 and sent him to a nearby store for some articles. On his way there two other boys, a couple of years older, stopped him and took his money. City Police were immediately notified when the boy returned with his mother empty handed and Constables Loring and MacLean, having first received a description of the youths, started a search and shortly after located one of the boys who confessed. He also told them that the other boy lived about two miles in the country and had possession of the money. They had spent 35 cents and the remainder of the money was returned. The boys will appear in Juvenile Court this morning.

## To Observe Anniversary Of Ordination
