Looks To U. S. For Paper Market

CORNER BROOK, Nfld., Oct. 2 (CP)—Sir Eric Bowater, president of Bowaters pulp and paper mills here—biggest in the world—today expressed the hope of obtaining more United States markets for newsprint in view of the expected loss of sale to the United Kingdom. Sir Eric was commenting on a report from London that Britain proposes to switch her huge newsprint imports from the dollar markets of Canada to soft-currency sources in Scandinavia. He said his company now is planning to increase production to meet further orders agreed upon for delivery to the United States in January, 1950. He warned mill workers, however, that costs of production must come down and quality improve if the company were to expand sales in the highly competitive U.S. market.
