FORESTRY BATTALION OVERSEAS.—Canada wants 12,000 men to enlist at once so as to end the fight speedily. Axemen and millmen are called upon to enlist. Ages between 18 and 48, minimum height, 4 ft. 11 in. Medical examination is not as strict as for the regular forces. Lt. Mon. Hardy will be at Forest Hill, Thursday 19th; St. Peter's, Friday 20th. It is to be hoped that many will meet him at these places and sign on. The pay and allowance are the same as for the fighting forces.
