THE DIASTER AT MONANGAH W. VIRGINIA

Fifty-three Bodies Have Been Brought To Light Out Of Over Four Hundred Victims Of The Mine Explosion, The Rest Cannot Be Located And Seemed Doomed To Be Destroyed By Flames

MONANGAH, W. Va. Dec 9.—(Special)—Sixty hours after the terrible explosion of black damp that wrecked mines Nos 6 and 8 of the Fernmont Coal Co last Friday morning, fifty three, or only about one eighth of the total number of victims, have been brought to the surface, while less than one fourth of the total number

have been actually located. Others undoubtedly between 30 and 40 in number, lie in the unknown section of the east workings that extend two miles and more back from the main entrances to the mines.
