GOOD LAYERS.—The Top of the Hill Farm—the new poultry plant, which has recently started, on Mt. Edward Road, is meeting with great success in the way of producing eggs.—This farm has 40 of the famous Tom Barron, White Leghorns. The strain which has broken all world's records for laying and 40 of Gullis Park bred to lay strain to Barred Rocks, Mated up for the season's hatching eggs, and although our weather the past two months has been very severe, these birds, especially the Leghorns have laid wonderfully well under the conditions.—Hatching operations have also begun, and 200 eggs are now on their way to hatching. It is the intention of this farm to hatch 2000 chicks this summer, in order to have at least 500 pullets in their laying pens for 1916.
