OBITUARY.—We deeply regret to record the death of an aged and highly esteemed resident of Mt. Mellick, Lot 49, Mrs. Elizabeth Lane, relict of the late Samuel Lane, Esq., which occurred on Saturday evening the 23rd of January. Mrs. Lane was the second daughter of the late Henry and Bessie Lodge, and was born at Willow Hall, Yorkshire, on the 27th January, 1837, so had she at the time of her death attained to within a few hours of the 94th anniversary of her birth. She came to this Island with her parents and other members of the family in 1820 and settled in Tracadie. In 1829 she was united in marriage to Mr. Lane and became the mother of eight children, four of whom preceded her to the spirit world, her eldest and dearly beloved son Henry, with whom she resided having passed away on the 19th January, after only a few days illness. Thus in death they were not separated. The surviving members of the family are John C. and Mrs. Jenkins of Glenfman, Mrs. Boswall of Pleasant Hill, Lot 49, and Philip S. of Taunton, Mass., who with grand-children and great grand-children are left to mourn. She was a consistent member of the Methodist Church and a regular attendant at the house of God, her place being seldom vacant. She will be much missed in the community for by her kind, gentle, sympathetic disposition she had endeared herself to all, but most in the home where she had been the idol so to speak. Her remains were interred in the cemetery at Pownal on the 29th by the side of those of her husband, there to await the resurrection morn. Rev. R. Opie officiated.

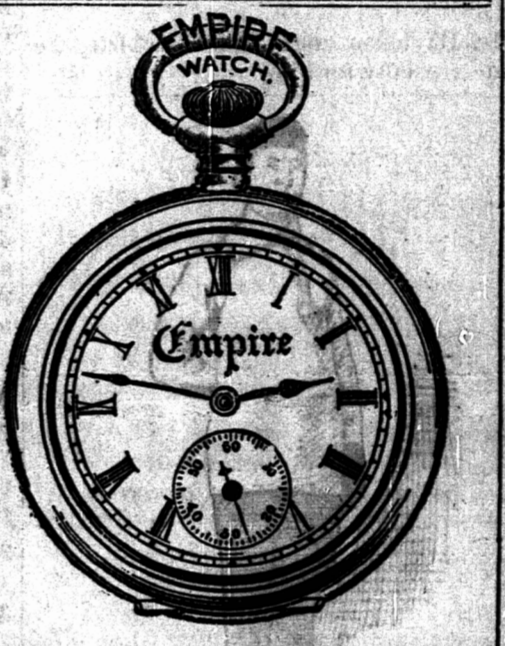
