Dorothy Dix Says—

CONGENIALITY IS ESSENTIAL IF MARRIAGE IS TO SUCCEED

Having Same Points Of View And Liking Same Things Mean Continual Happiness

Dear Dorothy Dix—Recently I broke my engagement to a man whom I love very much because all of our tastes, habits and ideas about life are entirely different. What he likes I disliked, and what I enjoyed doing bored him to tears. In the four years we were engaged he never once consulted my pleasure about anything. We always did what he wanted to do, and he finally told me that I would have to take him as he was because he did not intend to change. And, as I couldn't see any happiness in a marriage where I was to do all the pleasing, I called it off. Yet my heart aches for him and I am desperately lonely without his companionship, and I am wondering if being able to see each other draws them closer together as times goes on.



ANSWER—I think you were wise because congeniality is the most important thing in marriage. It is more essential than love because it lasts longer, for it does not take long for a husband and wife who fight over every trivial incident in their lives to kill love between them, whereas having the same points of view and liking the same things draws them closer together as times goes on.

If we could achieve the success of our marriages by making one great heroic sacrifice, it is just a long succession of little ones.

We are not called upon to give our life blood to save our mates, nor to relinquish a vast fortune in order to marry them. We are called upon to live with them, day in and day out, and when we get happiness or misery from their company, we must choose whether we like our coffee weak or strong, and cheese with our pie or don't.

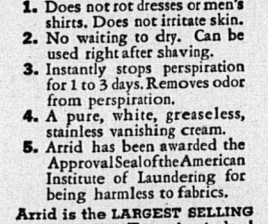

THE COOK'S CORNER

ORANGE-DATE-NUT LOAF

2 cups all-purpose flour
1-2 tsp. salt
3 tps. baking powder
1-2 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 tsp. orange rind
2 tps. lemon juice
1-2 cup chopped walnuts
1-2 cup chopped dates
3-4 cup milk

Sift flour, measure and sift three times with salt and baking powder. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, creaming until smooth; beat in eggs one at a time; then add orange rind, then flour mixture alternately with lemon juice and milk, beginning and ending with flour, and beating smooth after each addition. Add chopped nuts and dates. Turn into well-buttered loaf pan and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F) for 1 hour, or until well browned. Makes one loaf.

NUT BREAD

4 cups flour
2-4 cup sugar
1 egg
4 tps. baking powder
1 cup broken English walnuts
1 tsp. salt
1 cup milk

Sift flour, measure and sift again with sugar, baking powder and salt. Put into bowl and make

COFFEE CAKE

1 cake compressed yeast
2 cups sweet milk
1 tps. butter
2 eggs
Dissolve yeast in 1-2 cup warm water with 1 teaspoon sugar. Scald milk, melt butter in it, and when cooled to lukewarm add well-beaten eggs and yeast. Stir in flour enough to make a soft dough and set in warm place until light, from 2 to 3 hours. When light roll on well-floured bread board and put in greased pans. Let rise for about 1 hour, and when light, just before putting in oven, cover top with beaten egg. Mix 1-2 cup flour, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 cup brown sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, blend well, and spread on cake on top of egg. Bake at 375 degrees F. until nicely brown, about 40 to 45 minutes.

DISH-WASHING TIP

If your fine china has gold or silver encrustations, handle it gently while washing; use a soft brush or dish mop and wash one piece at a time; avoid too much or too strong soap suds and use no ammonia. Rinse and dry carefully.
