This would indeed be a very high standard for our farmers but in a short time the judging of the Competition for the best kept, managed and cultivated farm in each county will be taking place. We will hope to hear of some very good results even if they cannot equal Mr. Moore's.—Com.

This is the time of year when a few hours can be spent profitably by every farmer going over his fields to see what new weeds are being introduced on his farm. The first year they make their appearance they are generally so few in number that they can be easily pulled and without much expense but after they have seeded even for one year the proposition may be altogether a different one. Nigh Flowering Catch Fly, Bladder Campion are two of the worst weeds in Ontario and they are getting a foothold in this Province. It is earnestly hoped that every farmer will look over his fields and will forward a sample of any strange weed he may find, to the Department of Agriculture for identification.

The relatives and friends of Miss Margaret Bagnall, of New Zealand, held a family reunion at the farm of James Dickieson, New Glasgow, Thursday. There was a very large attendance, including the members of the Bagnall, Stevenson and Dickieson families and their numerous friends. About three hundred sat at the tables and partook of one of the most bountiful repasts ever provided in a Province famed for its culinary art and the choiceness of its viands. Miss Margaret Bagnall conducted the enjoyable function and at the conclusion of the dinner John C. Clark, of Bayview, Miss Bagnall's oldest living cousin in Prince Edward Island, expressed the appreciation of all present for the unique celebration and for their thankfulness in meeting here and partaking together of the good things provided. 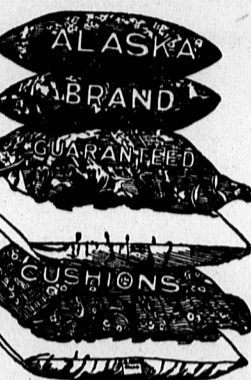
