(From Saturday's Evening Guardian) —SUMMERSIDE COURT.—Mr. John Murray charged with burning the barn of Mr. Jas. Horne in the fall of 1910 was brought before Stipendiary Wright at Summerside Thursday for preliminary trial. Charles Burke was the only witness examined. From his evidence it would appear that one night, two years ago last fall, he went up to Jacob Murray's and went driving with John Murray and while they were driving John Murray confessed to him that he had burned Horne's barn. Mr. Burke did not take action at the time because the barn did not belong to him. At that time he was under arrest for tampering with witnesses. At his preliminary trial he was sent up for the Supreme Court, but released on bail. He skipped bail and went to Maine. About two weeks ago John Murray gave evidence against him at his trial in the morning. On the same day about noon-time he (Burke) sent for Stipendiary Wright and laid the information against John Murray. He said he might have told Mr. McCullum that if Murray gave evidence against him he (Burke) would bring an action of barn burning against Murray. He never told anyone that Tom Murray had confessed to burning the barn. At this point the case was adjourned until Tuesday morning. Mr. Charles R. Burke, charged with conspiracy to steal foxes, was sent up for the June term of the Supreme Court.—J.
