RULES AND REGULATIONS 1948 FESTIVAL

Entries Close March 7, 1948

- The Festival is open to any (P.E.I.) organization, society, or amateur drama group, outside of Charlottetown and Summerside.
- An Entry Fee of \$2.00, the name of play, royalty or non-royalty, the name and address of person directing the play, or some responsible person in the cast, must be submitted to the Secretary-Treasurer Mrs. Ray MacLeod, not later than March 1, 1948.
- Festival will be held in May and June, dates to be arranged.
- An annual meeting will be held as soon as possible after the Festival at which the following are eligible to vote:
 - One delegate from any group or society which contributes or pays a Fee of \$2.00.
 - Contributing Annual Members (not less than 25c).
 - Life members: An Annual Member may become a Life Member by paying \$25.00.
- Plays shall be One-Act, non-royalty, or royalty not exceeding \$5.00. All plays shall be presented under original title.
- Play-offs, Semi-Finals, and Finals shall be arranged by the Provincial Drama Committee.
- Adjudicators for a Play-off may be chosen by the groups competing in the Play-off.
- Adjudicators for Semi-Finals shall be chosen by Provincial Drama Committee.
- Adjudicators for Finals shall be chosen by Provincial Drama Committee from outside the province.
- Plays shall be presented, when possible, in groups of 3.
- Drama Groups shall be allowed legitimate and reasonable expenses in the Semi-Finals and Finals. Balance of door receipts from same shall be paid into the Drama Festival Fund.
- Diplomas will be awarded to:
 - Winning Groups in (a) Semi-Finals (b) Finals
 - To the best Actor and Actress in (a) Semi-Finals (b) Finals
- The Provincial Drama Committee reserves the right to disqualify an entry for infringement of rules.
- Complaints or protests must be presented to the Secretary-Treasurer in writing within 48 hours and must be accompanied by a protest fee of \$1.00, said fee to be returned if protest is sustained. Decision of the Provincial Drama Committee in such cases shall be final.
- THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND LIBRARIES are co-operating in our Festival work to issue free of charge a catalogue of One-Act non-royalty and \$5.00 royalty plays suitable for Drama Festivals. This catalogue will be ready November 15th. Interested groups may obtain a copy without cost upon application to P. E. I. Libraries. Send to the Prince Edward Island Libraries, Charlottetown, for any play or plays in the catalogue you wish to read. Return plays to P. E. I. Libraries, and order from the Publishing House the number of copies of the play you have finally selected for presentation.
- THE LITTLE THEATRE GROUP OF CHARLOTTETOWN is prepared to co-operate as much as possible with organizations wishing to arrange a meeting for discussion on play production, including staging, send one or more of its directors to the meeting to contribute their experience. Won't You Come To Tea

Afternoon tea is perhaps the most pleasant as well as a most pleasant mode of entertainment. A cup of tea, well made and accompanied by thinly sliced buttered bread and a cookie, is all that is necessary for a delightful little party.

As the holiday season draws near, it is well to have the cookie tin filled, so one is prepared to extend an invitation to the friends who drop in for a little chat when they are home for a weekend or longer, or for the neighbor who brings her knitting over to check on the intricacies of the pattern. It is nice, also, to be ready to call up several cronies in the morning and invite them to bring their various bits of Christmas fancy work over to sew together and enjoy a little refreshment.

The Home Economists of the Consumer Section, Dominion Department of Agriculture have some cookie recipes which may be called "party fare" as they are a bit richer and sweeter than those we have been having during the last few years.

Meringues always make a hit, and contrary to common belief, they are easy to make. The oven temperature is the important point. Long slow baking to dry out the mixture, but not brown it, is essential.

When making meringues there is another cookie which uses egg yolks. The difference in texture and flavour of the two types makes them excellent companions.

Extra egg yolks may be utilized in custard or salad dressing.

MERINGUES

4 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup fruit sugar
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
Beat egg whites with salt until stiff. Beat in sugar very gradually. Add flavouring. Drop meringues on a lightly greased pan with a teaspoon or pastry tube. Bake 30 minutes in a slow oven, 260°F. Turn off heat, and leave in oven until completely dry. Makes about 3 dozen small cakes.

TREBLE COOKIES

1 cup shortening
1/2 cup brown sugar
2 egg yolks
3 cups pastry flour

OR 1 1/2 cups all purpose flour
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
Cream shortening and sugar thoroughly. Add egg yolk and beat well. Mix in flour, vanilla and salt. Form into balls, place on a greased cookie sheet and dent the top with a thumb. Bake 5 minutes in a moderate oven, 350°F. Then dent again. Bake 15 minutes longer. Put jelly or jam in the depression while still hot. Makes 3 dozen cookies.

DATE ROLL UPS

1 1/2 cups chopped dates
2-3 cup water
2-3 cup granulated sugar
1/2 cup chopped nuts
2-3 cup butter
1 1/2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs
3 cups pastry flour OR 2 2-3 cups all purpose flour.
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda.
Cook dates, sugar and water until thick—about 10 minutes. Add nuts and cool. Cream butter. Add sugar and cream well together.
