The bride was attended by her sister Miss Annie while the groom was supported by his cousin Mr. Chas. McKay of Park Corner. The many useful and valuable presents testified in no small degree to the popularity of the contracting parties. On the following day Mr. and Mrs. McKay drove to their new home in Darnley where a reception was tendered them by their many friends and acquaintances. The principal event of the evening was an address and presentation from the members of Court Glencoe No. 4071 I. O. F. of which the groom is an honored member and to which Mr. McKay suitably replied. The Mayor and all the Councillors were present at the regular meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening. After routine Mr. A. G. Saunders on behalf of Mr. Thomas Glover addressed the Board asking for change in the By-law restricting Milk Vendors, but the Council decided to delay the matter over till next year. Mr. Saunders then asked that Mr. Glover be given a rebate on his license fee. The matter was laid over until next meeting. A delegation from Charlottetown, consisting of Judge Warburton, Mr. P. Blake and Lieut. Col. Moore addressed the Council asking for a grant to assist in the building of a Monument in commemoration of the South African heroes. The matter was laid over until next regular meeting.

At the request of Mr. Thomas Beattie it was ordered that a light be placed in front of the Christian Church, Central Street. Dr. McLellan, health officer, reported that about 500 people had been vaccinated up to the present time. He referred to the matter of some not being in a position to pay for vaccination. After some discussion a committee consisting of Councillors Dickieson, Morris and Rogers was appointed to take into consideration the names of those unable to pay, the same to be submitted to the Town Clerk.

Mr. H. A. Compton addressed the Council claiming that in opening Cedar street the town had taken four feet of his land. The Mayor contended that the street had been properly surveyed. Coun. Morris here mentioned that the Town was in possession of the late Surveyor Clay's records and the same would soon need to be handed over to the land office. A motion was made that the portions of those books relating to Summerside be copied into a book by some good penman and signed by him and the Town Clerk at an expense not to exceed \$25.

On motion a proper dark lantern was ordered to be purchased for the use of the police.

Coun. Rogers referred to the matter of the police having stopped the captain of the S. S. Cammiana from landing freight at the town wharf on Sunday morning last. He thought that it was interfering with trade and commerce. Merchants and men outside the town expecting goods by that boat were disappointed owing to the steamer having been denied the privilege of landing freight.
