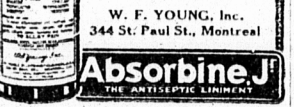

### Modern Medical Views on Alcohol

(By Dr. J. C. Houston, Charlottetown.)

III.

I have dealt on this action of alcohol on the nervous system because it is most important one, and as I said before if alcohol did not possess this property the state would have no liquor problem to deal with.

Some one may be saying, surely he is wrong. Alcohol is a stimulant, and that is the all-important action. When we think or speak of a stimulant, whiskey or brandy is what we mean. Doctors and nurses speak of it as a stimulant, and when they order a stimulant whiskey or brandy is generally what is understood. I grant all that, and nevertheless I unhesitatingly state not only that the main action of alcohol is on the nervous system but also the verdict of the authorities in medicine is that alcohol is not a stimulant in the true sense of the term. More than that it is actually a depressant to the heart and respiration in large doses. In proof of that, I am going to quote from the report of the Advisory Committee of the Board of Control:

"This chapter (Chapter XI, Action of Alcohol on the Respiration and the Circulation of the Blood) is concerned with some of the minor effects which follow the use of alcohol in moderate doses, effects so small that they are easily overlooked altogether and have no real importance in the ordinary use of alcohol by normal persons. It is at the first place it must be realized that a large part of the reputation which alcohol has enjoyed as a medicine is attributable to the belief that it stimulates a feeble heart or failing respiration. With medical men until comparatively recent years, alcohol was the favorite respiratory and cardiac stimulant, and indeed practically the only one available. It is still the most popular domestic remedy for the temporary failure of the heart and secondarily of the respiration which is known as 'fainting.' It is clearly of importance, therefore, to know whether alcohol really possesses the stimulating action on these vital functions with which it has been generally credited."

Here are the conclusions they arrived at:

"For our present purpose it is sufficient to have reached the conclusion that alcohol in moderate doses has no effect on respiration of practical importance either for its use by normal individuals or for its medical use. The only important effect of alcohol on respiration is the paralysis of the respiratory centre by large doses, which as another chapter shows is the cause of death in poisoning."

"No scientific ground has been discovered for any claim made on behalf of alcohol to practical value as a direct stimulant of the heart or of the respiratory centre of the body. When it appears to promote recovery from fainting, it probably acts simply by virtue of its irritant action on the mucous membrane of the mouth and throat. The fact that the beneficial effect appears almost immediately, and long before any significant amount of alcohol can have been absorbed and carried to the heart, is evidence for this local and indirect nature of the action. Its use in these circumstances is, therefore, comparable with that of smelling salts or the irritating fumes of hot water, traditionally employed for the same purpose. When in conditions of more protracted weakness of the heart, the administration of alcohol has a beneficial effect, this must be attributed mainly to its mildly narcotic and sedative action, relieving the heart of its load by the direct action of the heart, from the disturbing influence of pain and anxiety. The promotion of a patient's comfort, the relief of mental strain, may be an essential element in the treatment of disease, and an important factor in recovery. It does not, however, justify the description of alcohol as a stimulant of the heart. In this direction, as in others, the popular idea that it is a stimulant proves on examination to be scientifically untenable."

For my part I regard such statements from such an authority as conclusive proof that alcohol is not a stimulant, although I was taught that it was, and so used it for many years in my practice. It was thought that whiskey or brandy was almost a "sheet anchor" in cases of falling heart, especially in pneumonia, and that it could be given in tablespoon doses every hour or even every half hour. Now I believe this to be not only useless but actually harmful.

When the "Volstead Act" came into force in the United States some were wondering how they were going to treat pneumonia without whiskey, and one lady wrote the Good Housekeeping Magazine which, like most magazines nowadays, conducts a department for better health, and where questions pertaining to medicine may be asked. The medical man in charge of this department is Dr. Wiley. I can't vouch for his standing in the profession, as I do not know anything about him, but here is the question and answer: "What is the best substitute for whiskey in severe cases of pneumonia?" "Whiskey is the worst possible treatment to use in pneumonia, unless the object is euthanasia (death without pain or distress.) Pneumonia is bad enough of itself. Whiskey weakens the already weakened resistance, and helps secure a speedy and perhaps a painless death.
