The Kirk In Assembly

Peterboro, June 11.

Like a ray of sunshine streaking through a darkened sky, a suggestion made by the Moderator of the Assembly was accepted by all but two lone Commissioners, to try to bring light into the Knox College tangle. The suggestion was that a committee representative of both sides of the question be appointed by the court and allow them to examine the various documents. The documents in question are the report of the Knox College Board and the minority report of the same board, the memorial presented by Dr. Wardlaw Taylor, and the memorial submitted by the former Principal, Dr. Eakin, on his own behalf. These, coupled with the overtures sent forward from Guelph, London, Toronto and Moose Jaw Presbyteries, will be studied from all angles by the committee.

Three seditious have been given to the arguments from both sides. All other business has been side-tracked so that right of way might be given this important question. Judging by the applause, the Assembly has been swaying quite considerably in its judgment. Few of the speeches have been reasoned argument. Some have been calm and deliberate, others just a smattering of pious phrases, and still others nothing but an appeal to the emotions or prejudices. The applause, however, is difficult to judge, as some who have no vote, but are following the course of the debate from the side benches, are quite vociferous in their demonstrations. The majority of the Commissioners feel their position too keenly to indulge in noisy applause.

The craving of many is for more light. So far, the findings of the Commission and the reasons deduced from their mass of evidence have not been released. The assembly has no evidence on which to give a verdict, and a vote in open court up to the present time would have been only a snap judgment. Various speakers expressed the fear that if Professor Eakin were reinstated as Principal no assurance was thereby given the Church that similar deplorable conditions in the administration would not again emerge. Dr. A. T. Barr, on the other hand, stated that "everything is quite harmonious and the college is one." As the debate came to a close the Rev. F. M. Sampson of Atholstan, Quebec, rose to ask this question: "Why did Dr. Eakin, since he was present at the last Assembly, not make his appeal then against what he terms injustice?" The Clerk of Assembly, Dr. Wardlaw Taylor, explained that Dr. Eakin submitted.

The Rev. William Barclay of Hamilton rose to explain why he, as a member of the board, had refused to vote for the reinstatement of Dr. Eakin. The board was divided into three camps—those who wanted to take a strong stand for re-appointment; those, like himself, who desired to take a middle way; and those who were resolutely opposed to any reinstatement. He felt very strong that, no matter what the General Assembly may do so far as the principalship is concerned, it ought to broadcast this fact to the whole Dominion: that there was no moral fault on the part of Dr. Eakin.

The overtures on the Knox College situation that were presented came from Moose Jaw and London Presbyteries. Both of these claimed that the board had ignored the rights of Presbyteries to make nominations, and that no appointments should be made until notice had been given to all Presbyteries of the Church, and an opportunity afforded to make nominations. Rev. A. K. Davison of Moose Jaw and Rev. Dr. James Mackay of London spoke on these overtures, claiming that the democratic character of the Presbyterian form of government was imperilled.

The committee chosen to report on Monday afternoon has a well-balanced group of ministers and laymen. The Chairman will be Rev. William Barclay of Hamilton and Dr. J. S. Shortt of Barrie was chosen Vice-Chairman. The ministers are: Rev. G. J. MacArthur, Rev. W. T. Brown, Rev. D. H. Marshall, Rev. John Mustard, Rev. Edgar Foreman and Rev. A. S. Reid. The laymen are: J. W. Marshall, General St. Perre Hughes, James Dutton, A. M. Nairn and Judge A. G. Farrell.

The man on the street is asking what has caused the crisis in Knox College. What charges were laid against Dr. Thomas Eakin and Dr. Lloyd Morrow. At this juncture one can only indicate what charges have not been preferred. Is it a case of heresy? Absolutely, no. There has not been the slightest hint within or without the college walls that either was called into question because of his doctrinal outlook.

Have charges of immorality been laid against either? Here again most emphatically, no. So far as their moral conduct has been concerned not the slightest implication of moral malefeasance. The Rev. William Barclay said that whatever the General Assembly eventually decides, it must broadcast to the world that the charge against Dr. Eakin is not concerned with morals. Equally so is this true of Dr. Lloyd Morrow. The Assembly that clears any stigma or suspicion that may have arisen because the charges have never been made public must clear the good name of Dr. Morrow as well as Dr. Eakin.

A very welcome visitor to the Assembly was Rev. J. B. M. Armour, Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Mr. Armour was given a cordial reception and spoke briefly of the valuable aid given his society by the Presbyterian Church. The churches in all their missionary effort have no more valuable ally than the Bible Society. Rev. W. T. Brown supported Mr. Armour and pledged the Church to continue its interest and assistance to this most necessary work.

A most gracious speech was delivered by Miss Winnifred Ferguson Principal of the Deaconess Training Home. Miss Ferguson reported that fewer students are accepted at present, so that the supply of deaconesses may not be greater than the demand. Several new appointments were made during the past year and the home had been filled to capacity by university students.

The dinner to the Assembly, Commissioners and their wives was given in St. John's Parish Hall. The Women's Association of St. Paul's provided a most enjoyable meal, and Mr. James Dutton, a member of Session, welcomed the Commissioners cordially. He said that it had been in their mind for years to welcome the Assembly, and now it had come to pass in their centenary year. Dr. Barr called on the Moderator, Dr. Hugh Grant, who thanked the ladies in his kindly manner. Dr. Shortt, Dr. MacGillivray and Rev. W. G. Brown joined in felicitations on this happy occasion. Archdeacon Bigrave also spoke, welcoming the Commissioners.

Dr. Jessie McBean's review of the successful conduct of Presbyterian missionary effort in China was a striking feature. After twenty-seven years in China she was clearly convinced that the finest young men in that country believed that nationalism will never save China except Christianity saves nationalism. In the last decade a wave of patriotism has swept over the whole land, and their contact with Christian missions has stirred up the youth to desire a better education. The cream of their young leaders in that awakened republic owe their positions to Christian instruction in the arts and sciences.

Presbyterian College Report Presbyterian College, Montreal, reported that the registration of students in training for the ministry had almost doubled in the last five years. Quality as well as quantity had resulted, as the majority of those in theology were fully qualified graduates in arts; two of the students have the degree of Doctor of Philosophy. Under Dr. Scott Mackenzie's principalship the utmost harmony prevailed throughout the college. The Senate complained that the faculty is too small and a tremendous task has been forced upon the shoulders of the few professors. Dr. Scott Pearson resigned from the chair in Church History, as he desires to return to Scotland. The Assembly decided to

made the professional mice catchers wish they were engaged in another profession.

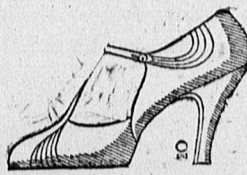

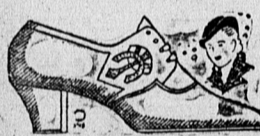

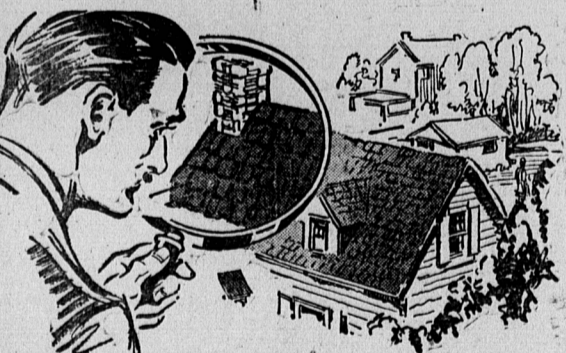
