SMALL MAJORITIES.

The Examiner last evening gave prominence to the statement that at the last federal election many Liberals were elected by comparatively small majorities—thirty eight in all having less than 200 votes each to the good. It is usually indiscreet for an Opposition organ to raise this point inasmuch as it usually happens that the Opposition, being in the minority, have a larger proportion of members returned by a slender vote than have the Ministerial party.
In the present case the Examiner's statement is quite true, but it is only a part of the truth. There were thirty-eight Liberals returned to Parliament at

last general election with majorities of less than 200 votes each. But there were also thirty-one Conservative members elected by majorities under 200 each. And as there were about 133 Liberals and only 80 Conservatives in the House, it follows that the proportion of small majorities was greatest on the Conservative side.

The point is not of great importance except that half truths are usually misleading and the party organs deal very largely in half truths at election times. There are always a number of members on both sides of the House whose majorities at the election were small. The number of these is usually largest in the party that has most members. That is, about all there is to it.

It was not purely in the interest of Charlottetown merchants and importers that the reporter of a local daily devoted a three column puff to an outside mercantile concern yesterday.

Premier Laurier has strengthened his position to some extent in Ontario by securing Mr. Aylesworth, K. C. as a colleague. Mr. Aylesworth is a man of notable ability and character, and is also popular.

The shooting of geese or other wild fowl between sunset and sunrise by the light of torches is illegal, the penalty being any sum not exceeding \$50 for each offence. The Guard is informed that such shooting is being carried on at Tracadie Bay, and perhaps elsewhere. It should be stopped at once.

The attention of the School Board is directed to the fact that some teachers in the city schools are reported to visit places where liquor is sold and in one or more instances have been summoned as witnesses. Teachers hold responsible positions in which good example counts for much. They ought not to be patrons of illicit liquor saloons.

It was unwelcome on the part of the Ottawa authorities to delay the appointment of the new Lieutenant Governor until the eve of the election. Had the appointment been made in the spring the appointment among a number of prominent but unsuccessful aspirants to the position would have spent much of its force in the months past. Time is a great healer, but as it is the party is called to battle at a moment when a number of prominent Liberals feel that their claims to a high position have been treated rather cavalierly. Under such conditions they cannot enter upon the work of the campaign with their old-time zeal. Their close friends and supporters share in their disappointment, and in some cases their resentment. These influences are now at work in Prince County and in East Queens.

Canadian Women.

Mr. P. B. Bell, Canadian Agent at Leeds, England, writing to Toronto Sunday World, says: Some little time ago I noticed that an English lady was writing some rather severe criticisms on Canadian women, and I wondered if it could be my friend, Mrs. Margaret Polson Murray. At that time I had not been very long in this country, and remembering my earlier predilection for English women I did not like to get in the mix up, more especially as I know how well able both our women and men are to defend the sex. The longer I live in the country the more predisposed I am to acknowledge the better qualities of Canadian women. Many years ago in my callow youth before I had been sufficiently acquainted with their many good points, on my trips here I was disposed to give foreign women the preference, but I thought I would allow my more matured judgment to speak before writing on the subject. It has been my privilege to visit Great Britain, Germany, Austria, France and the United States, and meet women in each of these countries. Hitherto I had always thought that English women were probably the finest, next to them the Austrian, having in mind a visit to Budapest in the late seventies. Looking at the matter after some years' experience I can say honestly that no nation produces a finer class of women than Canada. We do not, as the Germans do, have women for breeding children only, or as upper servants. We do not stand as a race, producing money to clothe the women in purple and fine linen only, as the United States men do. We do not keep our girls back and not allow them to have any say for themselves until after they are married, as France or Austria. We take them something between the British and American. We have the good looks of both, and the sound common sense of the one and the good dressing of the other. We are apt to treat them more as companions than other nations.
