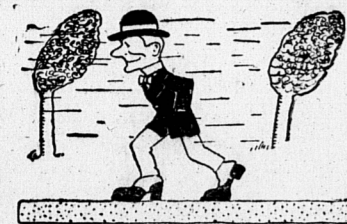

CHARLES V. HYDE, OF TRURO, MUST FACE TRIAL IN N. Y.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16—Charles Hyde, a native of Truro, N. S., the former city chamberlain, today, lost his appeal to the appellate division of the supreme court for a charge of venue. Therefore he must go to trial in New York County on the charge of bribery, growing out of the deposit of city money in the Carnegie Trust Company and the Northern Bank Hyde was to have been tried about two months ago before Justice Davis. He asked for a change of venue on the ground that the public mind in this country had been prejudiced against him, and that he could not receive a fair trial here. His application was refused and Hyde took an appeal. The decision of the appellate division in this case is not appealable.

KENT SMALLPOX BILLS IN DISPUTE.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 17—The application of the Board of Health in Kent county to compel the municipality of Kent to pay the bill of Dr. Allaire incurred during the smallpox epidemic was heard before Judge White in chambers last night. 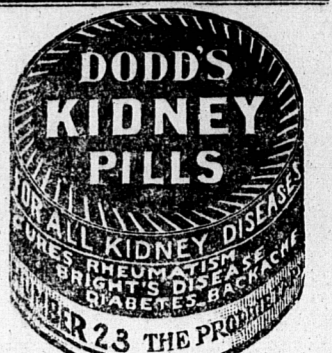
