CAMPAIGN OPENED

Public Meeting Held at Summerside.

IN THE FRONT RANK

Are Strong Temperance Workers—United Forces Determined to Roll up a Sweeping Majority.

At the mass meeting in Market Hall Thursday evening Mr. Thomas Schurman presided. In explaining the purpose of the meeting he said it was refreshing to temperance workers, to see the goal of their labors so near. It would be a privilege long looked for to vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of prohibition. It had been said that Canada is the most sober country in the world, that P. E. Island is the most sober province of the Dominion and Prince the banner county of the Island in the cause of temperance. While welcoming this assertion he had often wondered what other places could be like if worse than this. He urged the necessity of faithful work during the campaign.

Rev. G. C. P. Palmer was the next speaker. National law, he said, is the safety and protection of society, without this and the power behind it societies could not exist. While this is true it is true in a large sense that national law properly enforced is the safety and protection of the morals of the community. The bar of the police magistrate is more dreaded by many than the bar of God. The latter seems to them too far off, too intangible. There is more immorality in the minds of men than in their actions. More in the heart than in the hand. If men feared God more than their fellow men the heart would be cleaner than the hand. A strong incentive to clean living is found in the fear of national law. If the pressure of British law were removed from the community you would be amazed to find how many feet would slip, how many morals would lap. National law is a grand thing to help weak kneed Christians. That is what we claim for prohibitory law. It will come to the assistance of diving, that all we claim for prohibitory law is that it will aid the moral laws to sobriety and temperance throughout the land. The licensed system has been one of the great obstacles the church has had to contend with. It represented the parliament of the land operating against the Christian church. The liquor interest want us to continue moral suasion, but we have already tried the system too long. Such is the weakness of human nature, that men will say yes to the preachers—Yes! to the word of God and turn away and fall under the temptation to drink. There are many whose appetites have the upper hand of them who would hail with joy the enact-

ment of prohibitory law and who will go to the polls on the 29th and vote for it.

Stipendiary Magistrate Neil Macquarie gave a short and spicy address. The question of revenue he thought was not a very serious one. If you do not spend your money in liquor you will have to spend it on yourself or family. The main question is how will the law, if it comes into force, effect the community. If those who vote for it—and he presumed the majority would—would use every endeavor to have it enforced it would be a boon to the country. Those who vote for prohibition and afterwards buy liquor wherever they can get it are those who bring our laws into disrepute.

Rev. E. J. Grant followed with a rousing address. He expressed his interest in the addresses already given. In reference to the report of the Royal Commission, as quoted by Mr. Bell, he said the majority report had given the direct cost to Canada in 1893 of the drinking habit at forty million dollars. Mr. McLeod in the minority report figuring on this basis makes the indirect cost one hundred million dollars. So according to this estimate the drain on the natural resources of the country in consequence of the traffic is one hundred and forty million dollars. We have in Canada, a population of five millions. It is estimated that 7,000 are destroyed annually by the liquor traffic. We say we must have the revenue. What does this mean? It means that the people of Canada are dependent upon the money which the government charges the traffic, for the privilege of destroying the 7,000 people. A few years ago there flashed over the wires of the continent an account of a dreadful accident in a Springhill coal mine in which 121 men lost their lives. You remember how the great heart of the Canadian people was stirred to its depth, how messages of sympathy came from all parts of the country, how \$74,000 in voluntary contributions came rolling in to the sufferers. Suppose that the next Saturday morning intelligence of another such disaster had come in and the next Saturday morning and every Saturday morning from that time to this and at this date some one enquired the course and is told it is due to a certain explosive used in the mine. He asked if some less dangerous explosive might not be used and the reply is yes, but this is the only one on which the government can collect a revenue, how would you feel about it. Is there a man in Canada with a spark of manhood in his being whose indignation would not be stirred and who would not demand that this thing should cease instantly, revenue or no revenue. And yet the only excuse for the continuance of the liquor traffic is the revenue derived from it. A synopsis of J. H. Bell's speech will appear Monday.
