WOULD INCLUDE CODFISH IN TRADE TREATY

Britain Seeks Market For Newfoundland In Pact With Italy.

(C.P. Cable By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, April 29—Newfoundland codfish were especially mentioned in notes exchanged April 27 between the British and Italian governments with regard to trade.

First—The authorized percentage of fish to be imported from Newfoundland should be 70 per cent of the total fish imports into Italy during the period April to June 30 of the following year.

Second—Any foreign exchange received from the sale of Italian goods exported to Newfoundland should be devoted to meeting the debts due in respect to importation of goods of Newfoundland origin into Italy.
