Price Control Questions And Answers

Questions and Answers on Price Control will appear in *The Guardian* as a regular feature each day. The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this region. The answers are provided by the Board Readers. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee, Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Q. There is to be a change of tenants in an apartment I own. Is there any procedure I must follow in notifying the Board?

A. Yes, a landlord, whenever his tenants change, should secure a copy of form R. C. 40 from the Rental Board, and return to the Board office a completed copy of this form.

Q. I have recently been discharged from the Army. How do I secure a permanent ration book?

A. Apply at your nearest Local Ration Board. Since August 1, Local Ration Boards have been responsible for the issuance of ration books to discharged Army personnel.

Q. I have seen that some ammunition is to be released to sportsmen. Where must I make application to obtain my quota?

A. Applications for a purchase permit for ammunition should be made at your nearest Local Ration Board between August 15 and September 30, inclusive. Purchase permits will be valid from September 1 to December 31. In making application, the applicant must present both his gun registration card and his ration book or ration card.

Q. How do I get a permit to sell my gun?

Roll high, place pastry on a floured board about ¼ inch thick, and cut into large rounds about 4 inches in diameter. Serve with gravy or hot chili sauce.
