In Memoriam MRS. JOHN ELLIS

At Northam, Feb. 11 1921 there passed peacefully away, Mrs. John Ellis, formerly Miss Susan Ann Key, one of the best and most respected residents in the community at the ripe age of 81 years and 25 days. She was born in Scot. Feb. 17, 1840 where she spent her younger days with her parents.
