ENGLISH CUP IS CAPTURED BY SUNDERLAND

King And Queen Watch Winners Stage Thrilling Rally In Second Half

WEMBLEY STADIUM, London, May 1.—(CP Cable)—Coming from behind in a terrific second-half offensive, Sunderland captured English Football Cup honors for the first time today with a 3-1 English victory over Preston North End. Frank O'Donnell gave Preston a 1-0 first half lead but goals by Gurney, Carter and Burbanks swept the favorites to victory before the second period was over.

Following the victory, the King who with the Queen and King Farouk of Egypt had watched the encounter from a flower-embowered royal box, presented the cup and medals to the victors.

93,000 in Attendance

An estimated 93,000 spectators who had found their way to the great enclosure despite a strike involving 25,000 busmen watched a tussle that developed from mediocrity into a thrilling battle between the two well-matched squads.

Twenty nervous players put up a ragged exhibition for most of the first half in which Frank O'Donnell, brilliant Scottish international centre-forward, sent Preston into the lead after 37 minutes. From that point on the standard of play improved as Sunderland, "The team of all talents", settled down to its customary methodical match-winning game.

In the second half the power of the Roker Park attack carried all before it for most of the 45 minutes. Six minutes elapsed when Gurney equalized from a corner placed accurately by Burbanks, left-winger. It was a thrilling climax to a fine combination by Sunderland's vanguard.

Sunderland Unstoppable

With the wind at their backs there was no stopping the Sunderland attack that for minutes at a time in the first half seemed impotent against Lancashire's robust defence. After 71 minutes of play Gurney passed to Carter, Sunderland's English international inside right and captain, who sent a sizzling left-footer into the right hand corner of the net from 15 yards out. Five minutes later Burbanks ended scoring as the culmination of the most thrilling movement during the game. The whole forward line combined in a raid on Preston's goal, Burbanks netting by banging the ball past Mapson's outstretched arm after receiving an accurate pass.

Ragged play marked the closing minutes with the ball frequently being kicked into touch. Preston had one brief raid but the movement was aimless and lacking in finishing power.

DOMINION BASKETBALL TITLE CHANGES HANDS

Titleholders Face Strong Challenge

MONTREAL, May 2.—(CP)—Toronto's Simpson Avenue United Church junior basketball squad, Dominion titleholders, face a four-point deficit for the second game of a total-points Dominion junior final series against Young Men's Hebrew Association of Montreal whom they eliminated a year ago. Y.M.H.A. won the first game last night 20-16 with the second scheduled for tomorrow night.

Weight and experience of the Canadian champions failed to impress the Montreal boys who played a keen scientific game. Both teams were on the defensive throughout and left definite attacking strategy until the last minutes of the game. Simpsons are facing their strongest test in three years of championship basketball in which they have never lost a title.

Pittsburgh Wins Two Games Over Weekend While Cubs Take Two Wins From Cards

Pirates Leading Pack

Pittsburgh Pirates took first place, defeating the luckless Reds 7-2 in Cincinnati as Chicago tripped St. Louis Cardinals.

A crowd of 17,483 saw Joe Bowman distribute nine hits in his first start for the visitors, while his mates, led by little Lee Handley, battered two of four Red hurlers for 11 fatalities.

Herman Seventh Cub Casualty

Chicago's jinx-ridden Cubs won and lost again, conquering St. Louis Cardinals 4-1 in Chicago behind Bill Lee's sparkling three-hit hurling, but losing the services for probably a week of their star second baseman, Billy Herman.

Herman became the seventh member of the squad to sign the hospital roll when a nail was torn from a finger on his right hand.

The Cubs made only eight hits off Lefty Bob Weiland in eight innings but bunched four of them in the sixth for three runs. The lone Cardinal run was scored in the ninth when Terry Moore tripled and scored as Stu Martin went on.

Mungo Hurls Three-Hitter

The Dodgers finally got around to giving Van Lingle Mungo some support and cashed in on the fireball right hander's three-hit pitching for a 5-1 victory over the Phillies in Brooklyn.

For seven innings, Claude Passeau and Mungo hooked up in a tight pitching duel. In the eighth, however, the Dodgers found the range and collected all of their runs in one big spree.

The St. Louis gas house gang blew up at Chicago Saturday as they absorbed an 11-4 licking from the Cubs.

Pittsburgh Pirates found the range in Cincinnati in the sixth inning to come from behind and defeat the Reds 3-1.

Philadelphia Athletics scored a 4-2 win over Brooklyn Dodgers, while at Boston the Bees nosed out the Giants 3-2.

WindsorFords Dethroned By B. C. Squad

BY IVAN CORBETT Canadian Press Staff Writer VANCOUVER, May 2.—(CP)—Windsor Fords, champions of Canadian men's basketball in 1936 and runners-up to United States for Olympic honors at the Berlin games, turned over their national title to University of British Columbia Thunderbirds today.

Thunderbirds dethroned Fords with a 23-30 victory last night in the fourth game of the best-of-five Dominion final. Varsity won the first two games 31-29 and 31-30 but Windsor prolonged the series with a 28-23 win on Friday.

A single point separated the teams in total points scored in the four games. The collegians scored 106 to Windsor's 107 in winning the championship for the second time in five years. Varsity held the title in 1932.

Baseball's "Big Six"

In another sweeping upset of leaders, Gerry Walker, Detroit's outfielder, returned to the American League batting lead, and Gil Brack, Brooklyn rookie, took over the National Baseball League pace yesterday in baseball's "Big Six" in hitting.

Walker got three-for-three to boost his mark 40 points to 588, dropping Rick Ferrell of the Red Sox into second place, while the idle Cecil Travis of the Senators advanced to tie for second.

Brack connected for four-for-four against the Phillies, and raised his mark 87 points to 486, sinking Frank Demaree of the Cubs, with one hit in four chances, to second place Paul Waner of Pittsburgh fell to third, and Ducky Medwick of the Cards, hitless in three chances, fell out of the top half dozen.

Royals Lose Twin Bill; Leafs Split

MONTREAL, May 2.—(AP)—With Earl Cook pitching three-hit ball in the second game, the Chiefs swept both ends of a doubleheader from Montreal in Syracuse today 6-4 and 4-1.

More than 10,000 fans watched the home club snap a four-game winning streak of the Royals and run their own string of consecutive victories to five. A fly ball by pinch-hitter Arlett with the score tied and the bases full in the eighth decided the first game.

In the second, Cook hurled shutout ball except in the fourth, when a triple by Dugas and a single by Bell counted the only Royal run.

Red Sox Defeat Yankees Despite Home Runs By Gehrig And Selkirk

NEW YORK, May 2.—(AP)—Before the largest crowd of the young season, 52,150, Lou Gehrig snapped out of his homer-hitting slump here today, but his first round-trip clout of the campaign wasn't enough to save Yankees from a 5-4 beating at the hands of Boston Red Sox.

Errors at crucial moments by Frank Crossetti and Johnny Broaca, and a couple of timely extra-base hits by Jimmy Fox and rookie Bobby Doerr put the game on ice for the Red Sox, giving Footsie Marcum the best of a pitching duel with Broaca.

Broaca's error on Fox's easy tap in the ninth allowed Marcum to score with the winning run. Gehrig found the range with his four-bagger in the fourth to account for the first Yankee run. George Selkirk also pounded out a homer, driving Joe Dimaggio home in front of him in the sixth.

Walker's Hitting, the Feature

Gerald Walker smashed a home run in the seventh inning to give Detroit Tigers a 6-5 victory over Chicago White Sox in Detroit.

Walker had a perfect day at bat, with two singles and the home run, his third this season, in three times at bat. The score was tied at 5-5 when he drove the ball out of Navin Field.

Trailing by two runs as they came into the ninth, Washington Senators put on a five-run rally to win 10-7 and split a two-game series, in Philadelphia with the Athletics.

U. S. Tennis Team To Meet Australia

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.—(AP)—Frankie Parker of Milwaukee won his second singles match of the Davis Cup series between the United States and Japan when he defeated Futimaru Nakano 6-0, 6-3, 6-2 today.

The outcome had no bearing on the actual zone elimination as the American squad clinched the right to meet Australia in the North American zone finals Saturday with a doubles victory.

Parker's chop-strokes and steady play proved too much for Nakano, although the latter twice won on the service in the second set to make it a more evenly matched affair.

Saturday lanky Donald Budge, first ranking player of the United States, and stocky Gene Mako, national doubles champions, teamed to blast the Japanese duo of Jiro Yamagishi and Nakano off the courts 6-0, 6-1, 6-4.

The series had been virtually clinched Friday when Budge retained some of his fireball tactics to defeat Nakano 6-1, 6-1, 6-0, in the opening singles.
