Drab Trading Session On Mt'l. Market

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 1.—Prices dipped and rallied in drab trading on Montreal Stock Exchange Saturday and finished with trends prevailing in either direction.

Construction, textiles, papers and utilities were irregularly higher while lower prices ruled for metals, banks and rails. Liquors firmed. Selective demand boosted Montreal Power, Shawinigan, Winnipeg Electric preferred and Canadian Hydro-Electric preferred fractionally but mild selling squalls left B. C. Power, Canada Northern and Power Corporation on the downside.

International Nickel came back in late dealings and finished off 1-4 after dipping as much as 5-8. Noranda gained 1-8 after early heaviness while Hollinger was off slightly. Smelters, selling on odd lots, was unchanged.

Fractional firmness predominated among the papers for St. Lawrence Corporation preferred and Dryden while a small loss was shown by Bathurst. Howard Smith and Corporation preferred held steady. Sales totalled 12,903 shares; bonds \$8,700.

Transportation Issues Down On N.Y. Mart

(By Frank MacMillen, Associated Press Financial Writer) (A P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, March 1.—Transportation issues of all kinds were under fire in Saturday's short stock market session because of the authorized reduction in railroad passenger fares.

Equities of the railroads themselves suffered most, but rail equipment, aircraft and Greyhound Bus stocks likewise dropped. Numerous industrials survived the downward trend, however, and there were gains of fractions to more than 3 points in many instances.

Greatest losses were marked up by Santa Fe, Great Northern preferred, Louisville & Nashville, Northern Pacific and Pennsylvania. Only a major fraction was lost by New York Central, one of the lines which opposed the I. C. C. order. Greyhound Bus dropped 6 1-4 to 68 3-4 when it was shown the new coach rates neared some of the bus line schedules.

Changes in the Canadian list were confined to fractional ranges. Losers included Canadian Pacific, Distillers-Seagrams, Canadian Industrial Alcohol A, International Nickel, McIntyre-Porcupine, Hollinger, Brazilian and Canadian Marconi. Dome Mines, Ford of Canada A, Imperial Oil, Massey Harris, Shawinigan, Quebec Power and Power Corporation were slightly higher.

Volume of trading was light, only 880,760 shares changed hands, and the Associated Press average of 60 stocks eased 1 of a point to 61.5. For the entire list the decline was eased by a 3 1-2-point advance in J. I. Case and 1 5-8 in International Harvester, among the best of the industrials, and there were others, but less prominent, that made substantial gains.

The bond market was mixed with the secondary rail issues sagging.
