Gandhi Still Hints At Nationalist Revolt

(Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 5—Mahatma Gandhi said last night he had not yet been able to study the implications in Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald's last speech at the Indian Round Table Conference sufficiently to decide whether he would renew his civil disobedience campaign in India.

In any event, the Mahatma decided in a farewell interview, the decision would rest with the Nationalist Congress. "It is a great responsibility for any man to call upon a nation to go through a fiery ordeal again and therefore I shall not lightly resume the fight," he said.

"The terribly repressive ordinances introduced by the Viceroy in Bengal, however may upset all calculations and may any day precipitate civil disobedience, even on a National scale. We can not stand by and see the manhood of a whole province emasculated by such tyrannous measures."

He said he regarded the Bengal ordinances "as a cause of war unless they remain merely on paper and are not acted upon, but can not imagine measures of that kind not being in force."

He said his coming to England had been "most decidedly" worthwhile. "My work outside the conference has been far more valuable to me than that inside the conference," he said.

NEW VARIETY WHEAT MAY BULGE POCKETS

SASKATOON, Dec. 5—The revenue of farmers of this province could be increased at least \$500,000 by replacing Marquis wheat with a new wheat, Reliance, on more than 1,000,000 acres, according to Dr. J. B. Harrington, professor of field husbandry at the University of Saskatchewan. In tests conducted at the university during the last seven years the new variety outyielded Marquis by an average of 16 percent and gave a larger yield than Marquis at the experimental stations at seven places in Alberta and Saskatchewan during 1929 and 1930, the average increase being 11 percent. Dr. Harrington feels that this wheat could supplant Marquis where rust is not a menace and where an early wheat is not particularly needed.

Finnish Government Stresses Prohibition Enforcement Problem

(Associated Press) HELSINKI, Finland, Dec. 5—The Finnish Government tonight asked the diet to authorize a referendum to determine whether Prohibition shall be continued, repealed outright, or modified to permit medium strength wines and beer. With the referendum measure the Government submitted a statement declaring that during the 12 years Prohibition has been in effect there have been none of the expected changes in the nation's habits. Contrarily, the government statement said, the conflict between the law and the predilections of the people has led to brazen and pernicious violations of the statute. Destructive influences have been brought to bear against respect for law in general, the Government statement said, because violations of the dry law have become so common. In addition to the prevalence of drunkenness, the Government cited as a considerable increase in crimes of violence and declared that intoxicants had played a large part in it. Furthermore, prohibition has had unfavorable financial effects, causing a heavy tax burden to be laid on citizens living on legal in-
