BIG SUIT OVER DEADMAN'S ISLAND

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 8.—The suit of the King vs. the Vancouver Lumber Company, involving possession of Dead Man's Island, a valuable piece of property on the water front at Vancouver, was called for hearing in the Exchequer Court today. Announcement of the lease of the island given to the lumber company is sought on the ground that the paper was never regularly signed. The legal fight is one of long standing. The property originally was included in the military reserve. In recent years the value of the property has increased several million dollars. It is now sought by two railway companies for use as terminals.

GRAVE HAPPENING IN PORTUGAL

MADRID, Sept. 6.—The Correspondencia de Espana prints a report that grave events are happening in Portugal, but gives no details in this connection. A despatch from Tuy, which lies opposite the Portuguese town of Valenca de Minho, says that the garrison at that place has been strongly reinforced by cavalry and artillery. The gates of the city are closed at sunset, and the streets are regularly patrolled.

people in the matter should be got by means of a plebiscite. Councillor Wright said that the company were having a meeting of the shareholders that night to decide whether they were going to sell or not. If they decided to sell they would hold the matter over until they got the decision of the Council and give the Council an opportunity of going to the people.

The Mayor: They have an offer before them now and if they decide to sell they could do so immediately.

Mr. McKenna: The estimated value of the plant is \$113,150.

Mr. Taylor said that he took it that the company was going to change hands. The council had been asked to make an offer for its plant. That offer had to go in that night. That resolution was simply to stay the proceedings as it were until the Council were in a position to get the opinion of the public. He could not see anything binding in that resolution. He thought it was the proper thing to go through that night.

AN OBSTRUCTION.

Mr. Wright said that those Councillors who spoke of the city getting a new plant forgot that in the present agreement with the Light and Power Company the city could not build such a plant for eight years yet, and there was a clause in the contract which permitted the company or its successors to increase the rate for lighting by 18 per cent., that was from 11 cents to 13 cents. That increased rate would mean an advance of \$4,000 a year on the citizens for eight years, which would be about one-third of the cost of the plant. It would be difficult to get public sentiment to consent to the starting of a municipal plant in opposition to a plant which had been serving them for so long. Even if it cost a little more under city management to run the present plant than under private company management, the city would make money.

Mr. McLean: If the people of Charlottetown buy this plant for \$96,000 they will be making the biggest mistake of their lives. It is out of all reason and out of all sense. He was opposed to it from first to last, and especially opposed to the matter being put through in that way, without the people being given a chance of voting on it.

Mr. McNeill: If these people want to sell their plant, let them put a price on it. It would be a disgrace to the Council if this resolution were passed to-night.

Mr. Campbell said that they were charged \$35,000 for the wiring which had all been worn of its insulation, while the poles were rotten. He asked the Recorder: Is it legal for men sitting at the Council Board to vote on selling their own goods?

AN EXPERT'S VALUATION.

Mr. Riley pointed out that the valuation which had been submitted to the Council was made by an expert, and it was a valuation that the Maritime Trust Company proposed.

to accept. It had been made out by one of the most expert firms in that business in Canada, and he did not think they would jeopardise their reputation by making false statements. He did not also think that the chairman and the directors of the Light and Power Company would make false representation to the city, because if they did they would be amenable to the law. It was all very well for members to speak of the city building a new plant. Those things were not done in a day. The facilities were not always so available as they were now. If the city allowed that outside corporation to come in and take the plant over they would find it rather a difficult matter to get them to let go again. That had been the experience of other cities. He supposed reference was made to him, that should not vote in that matter on account of his interest more or less in it. He could assure them that personally it did not make any difference to him if the city got that business or not. Its sale meant to him a matter of only a few dollars. His only reason for wishing to see the city get that plant was that the city would do well by it. It would be a good purchase for the city, and he did not think the city would get another such offer for a long time. He did not wish to vote in the matter, and so he left the Council Board when the matter was put to the vote.

THE RESOLUTION CARRIED.

The Mayor: It appears that I shall have to give casting vote in this matter. I have only two paltry shares in this business, and I can assure you that it has no influence on me whatever.

In reply to Mr. Campbell, the Recorder said that there was nothing in the world that disqualified a man by the mere fact of holding stock in another corporation from voting in matters affecting them. It was only a matter of personal taste.

Mr. McLean asked whether it was legal to take a vote on that question that night.

The Recorder: It is.

The resolution was put to the vote and was carried, Messrs. McLean, Campbell and McNeill against, and Messrs. McKenna, Walker, Taylor and Wright in favor of it. Mr. Riley not voting.
