WAR THREATENS IN BULGARIA

And the Struggle May be Nearer Than Believed

Bulgarian War Minister Speaks Strongly—Turkey Denies a Sinister Report—Another Fatal Cloudburst.

TURKEY AND BULGARIA. LONDON, July 3.—(Special)—The view is gaining ground that an outbreak of war between Turkey and Bulgaria is nearer than is generally supposed.

THE WAR MINISTER SPEAKS. The Bulgarian War Minister said: "We will never attack Turkey, but stand prepared to defend with Serbia our constitution and rights."

"War would endanger us both, but should rebellion remove the Sultan we would march on Constantinople and set his son on the throne."

TURKEY DENIES A REPORT. CONSTANTINOPLE, June 3.—(Special)—The Porte denies the Bulgarian allegations regarding the concentration of Turkish troops at strategic points on the frontier.

ANOTHER FATAL CLOUDBURST. WALLACE, TEXAS, July 3.—(Special)—A cloudburst and tornado swept over the country between San Antonio and Corpus Christie today.

Eleven persons lost their lives near Pettus.

ST. PETERSBURG IS DISTURBED

Over the American Petition in Behalf of Russian Jews

Russia Tolerates no Interference and Thinks Americans Should Not Originate Anti-Lynching Petitions.

St. Petersburg, July 3.—(Special)—President Roosevelt's decision to forward to the Russian Government a petition on behalf of the Russian Jews is not published here.

The Foreign Office says that Alexander Third would have never received such petition. Americans ought not to send an anti-lynching petition.

SOUTH AFRICAN FEDERATION

Lord Milner Thinks it Coming But Not Immediately

Burgers Don't Want Asiatic Labor, Nor to Now Shoulder the War Debt—Botha Talks—Financial Situation Good

IMPORTANT MEETING OF BURGERS.

HEIDELBERG, South Africa, July 3.—(Special)—A meeting of burghers held on Thursday adopted resolutions regarding the proposed introduction of Asiatic labor and asking the Government not to place the war debt on the country before representative institutions shall have been granted.

ATTITUDE OF THE DUTCH.

General Botha said the Dutch did not wish to obstruct but to assist the Government.

SOUTH AFRICAN FEDERATION.

JOHANNESBURG, July 3.—(Special)—The Intercolonial Council is convened here.

Lord Milner delivered the inaugural address and said the financial situation is reassuring and though rapid expansion is improbable in the near future steady progress is certain.

He disclaimed any intention of forcing federation but remarked that it would come though he did not expect it for some time.
