He has experienced a great deal of rough work in the field of war, but looks good for a good deal more. His manner is very pleasing, but there is about the man a suggestion of determination, and looking at him it is easy to understand how he was the first man to dash into Ladysmith at the head of his troopers after a long siege.

THE first day's racing on Sussex track saw two contests a 2.20 class and a 2.25 class. A cold north west wind met the horses on the back stretch and fast time was impossible. The contests were good, however, and witnessed by a fairly large crowd. The 2.20 class was won by Doncella, owned by J. B. Gilchrist of Springhill, N. B., Bourbon taking second money. The result of this race was somewhat of a surprise, as it was expected that Fairview Chimes would lead the field, but the best the gelding could get was third money and he was then beaten two out of three heats by Rock Farm Grace for third place. Starlight the Halifax horse finished third in the last heat, while Roberval brought up the rear in each heat. Best time 2.21. It took four heats to decide the 2.25 class which was won by Daisy DeWett. The Bridgetown mare lost the first heat to Annie Brevet, but she captured the three succeeding ones and the race.
