Veteran Amerks Display Power With Surprise 2-1 Victory Over Maple Leafs

TORONTO, Nov. 20 (CP)—After a personal display by boss Red Dutton of the fire he injects into his ranks, the aging but still amazing Americans went on to down Toronto Maple Leafs 2-1 in a National Hockey League contest here Saturday night.

The fiery sorrel top withdrew the New York team from the ice after arguing the second period was completed, although the horn had not blown. Dutton won his point. It was discovered the sound equipment on the giant clock had failed to function and play had actually gone three seconds past the 20-minute mark.

The A's were trailing at the time and between periods Red continued the forcible oratory that won him a decision over Referee Babe Dye. The official had ordered a facelift to end the period. Dutton's pep talk worked and early in the third session, the Americans tied the count, to force overtime.

Schriner Gets Winner

Sweeney Schriner, big left winger, gave the start-up team their third win in five starts when he scored on a neat play with the veteran Hooley Smith and Lorne Carr. Both teams were at full strength at the time but earlier goals were scored while the Leafs were short-handed.

While Billy Kampman was cooling his heels in the first period the Leafs broke away from a New York gang attack and scored their lone marker. Nick Metz, standing to the right of the American net, flicked Babe Dye's shot and Earl Robertson had no chance to save.

As early as midway through the second period, Dutton gave the season's largest crowd here—12,200 fans—a fine display of gangling as he sent out five forwards.

Turk Broda, one of the game's stars, made numerous brilliant saves as the New Yorkers buzzed around his cage.

Tommy Anderson shattered Broda's charm early in the third period when he batted down Schriner's shot as Murph Chamberlain was serving a two-minute term.

Shore Leads Bruins To Win Over Detroit

BOSTON, Nov. 20—Their defence crumbling under a last-period assault, Detroit Red Wings tonight absorbed a 4-1 beating from Boston as the Bruins came from behind in a furious attack late in the National Hockey League game.

Eddie Shore celebrated his return to Boston's lineup by inspiring the Bruins' "Kitchener kids" into a tale but furious scoring burst that overwhelmed the Wings before 12,000 fans.

The dynamic defence-star, who had been a holdout until last week, rallied his forces by leading a rink-length charge that carried him into the right corner, from where he aimed a pass that little Bobby Bauer snapped into the Detroit goal.

Not to be outdone, Milt Schmidt and Woody Dumart, the other Kitchener boys, countered in rapid order, the former assisting after trapping the Red Wings in the centre zone.

The game was an even battle until Shore scored the youngsters. Neither team was able to break through during the first two frames, when goalies Tiny Thompson for Boston and rookie Harry Hays for Detroit performed in brilliant fashion.

The first counter was registered against the Boston goal by big Charlie Conacher, with Mud Bennett's assistance, but the visitors held the advantage only six minutes, until Coney Weiland rammed in Bill Hollett's pass-out.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Nov. 20—(CP)—A change in goalies failed to halt Montreal Canadiens' long losing streak tonight as they dropped their sixth successive National Hockey League game—a 2-1 decision to the New York Rangers—that plunged them into the League cellar.

Goals by Lynn Patrick and Phil Watson in the first and second periods gave the New Yorkers their fourth straight game of the season before a crowd of 14,250, and left Lester Patrick's young team undefeated since the start of the schedule.

The habitant, with goalie Will Guise benched in favor of Claude Bourque, a Montreal amateur from Moncton, N. B., played a closely co-ordinated game. Their forward lines showed splendid co-operation but individually the players lacked the scoring punch of the Rangers.

McGill Redmen Win Senior College Title

MONTREAL, Nov. 20 (CP)—A decade of football defeats were forgotten today as McGill University acclaimed its Redmen as 1088-39 senior Intercollegiate Champions.

Coach Doug Kerr's men, many of whom came to McGill four years ago with their mentor, succeeded Queen's University to the title Saturday with a brilliant 9-0 victory over University of Western Ontario Mustangs in a sudden death playoff. Victory gave McGill its first championship since 1928.

More than 13,000 spectators watched the Redmen hold the vaunted Mustang attack in check and pile up one single point after another on Herbie Westman's superlative booting. The blond halfback, closing his college football career in brilliant fashion, kicked all the points.

There was nothing spectacular about McGill's victory. The Reds played straight football, throwing only three forward passes and relying almost entirely on Westman's kicking to keep them on the attack.

Against this type of play and on a muddy field that held their feet backfielders in check, the Mustangs could do little. Not once did they come within scoring range as costly fumbles and McGill's wide-wake defence of forward passes made a completely different picture from that in London, Ont., last week when the Mustangs qualified for the playoffs by trouncing McGill 16-6, McGill's only loss of the year.

Northwestern Defeated By Notre Dame

NEW YORK, Nov. 20—(CP)—With two flashes of traditional opportunism the Ramblers of Notre Dame overcame a stiff Northwestern team 9-7 Saturday and kept unblemished their 1938 record as they surged forward for national honors in this season's United States college football campaign.

The first score of the game came early in the second quarter when Willard Hofer, second-string Irish quarterback, pulled down a Northwestern aerial and, with his mates switching quickly from defence to attack, centered the yard behind perfect blocking for a touchdown. The kick failed.

Outplayed by the inspired Wildcat team, Notre Dame were helpless against another Northwestern drive and before the end of the quarter George McGurn put the Wildcats in the lead with a touchdown which Conleas converted. In the second half the Irish pulled themselves together and had the edge over the Wildcats when Hofer wrote the story of the game by kicking a field goal from the 20-yard line on a fourth down.

Texas Christian, Duke and Oklahoma untied and defeated, also maintained their claims for national recognition.

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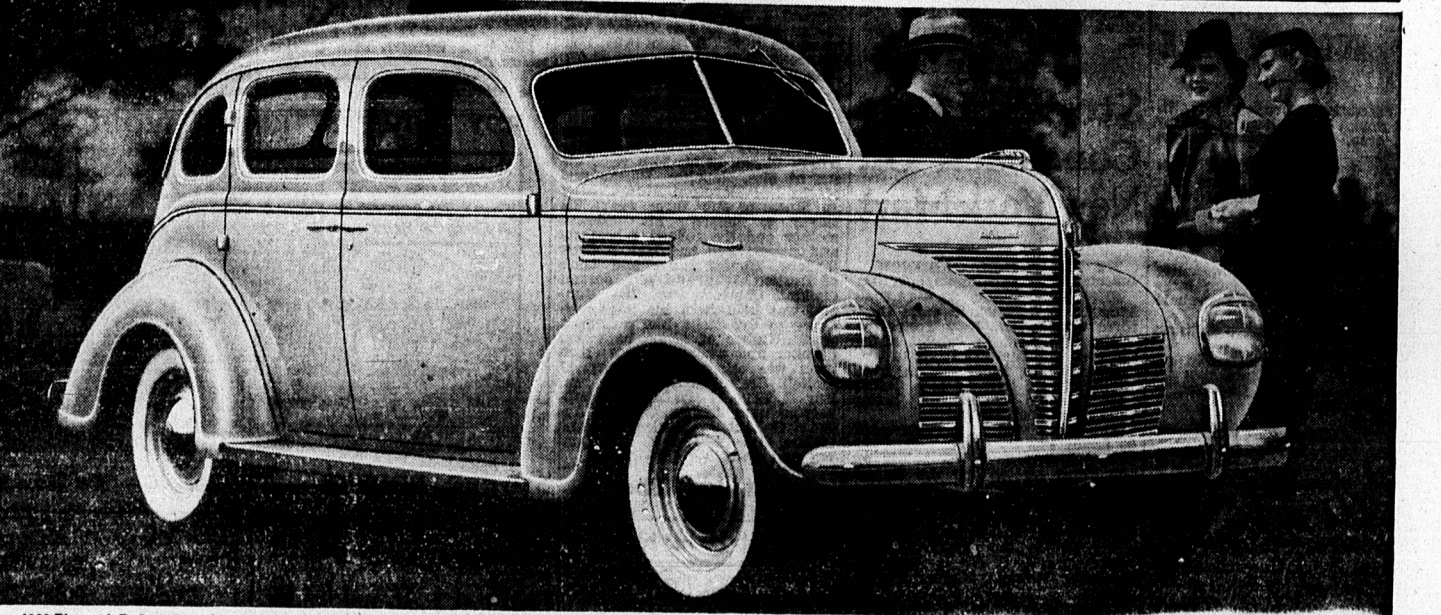
