

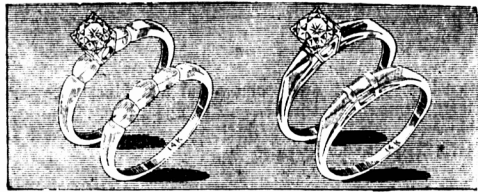

Egg Receipts Continue To Show Increase

Egg receipts on P.E.I. continue to show a decided increase over previous weeks, according to the Dominion Department of Agriculture Egg and Poultry Market report supplied by Mr. F. M. Nash, senior poultry products inspector. Quality is holding steady. Undergrades are due chiefly to soiled and dirty eggs. One carlot was inspected for export to Great Britain this week and another carlot is now being prepared for the latter part of the week. Prices remain unchanged.

P. E. I. stations are quoting for ungraded eggs delivered: A-large, 30-31c; A-medium, 28-29c; A-pullet and B, 22-24c; C, 17c. Graded shipments (f.o.b. shipping point): A-large, 35-36c; A-medium, 33-34c; A-pullet and B, 29c; C, 22c.

Specialized producers are receiving for cartoned pack: A-large, 40-41c; A-medium, 38-39c; A-pullet, 32-33c.

Poultry receipts are practically all. Prices are unchanged.

1947 Chevrolet Announcement

OSHAWA: With virtually no interruption of production for change-over, General Motors of Canada today announced its new line of 1947 Chevrolet passenger cars, comprising 11 models in three series, all smartly restyled.

The three series are the specially styled Fleetline, the deluxe Fleetmaster and the economy-range Stylemaster. All show marked advances over previous models in exterior styling and trim and in interior finish and fittings, the announcement said.

The traditional shut-down for new model switch-over was bypassed in making the change at this time, according to E. J. Umphrey, Director of Sales.

"Not only was the usual shut-down for retooling avoided," Mr. Umphrey said, "but there was virtually no decrease in the rate of output when these models went into production. On the day of the change-over, the first of the new models followed the last of the old on the assembly lines almost without a gap."

"GM thus was successful in its determined effort to bring out an improved line of motor cars without halting or seriously retarding production, in order that the great number of waiting purchasers—both those who have placed orders and those planning to do so—should encounter no additional delay."

"This factor is one reason why changes have been confined largely to those improvements that could be made without causing the car-buying public to face further inconvenience and disappointment," Mr. Umphrey said.

In restyling the new Chevrolet, emphasis has been placed on a more massive front end and a smoother sweep to body contours. New front-end grille and complimenting bright work, as well as elimination of the body belt moulding give the new model an air of greater luxury.

Body interior changes include new ultra-modern instrument panels, new ornamental treatments of the door upholstery panels and scuff pads, new colors in garnish mouldings, new steering wheel and horn button caps and new friction-type adjustable sun shades.

In all instrument panels, the dials, indicators, controls, clock and glove compartments locations remain unchanged, but the panels and their equipment are completely new in color and decoration. A one-piece, die-cast, radio grille of new design is the outstanding feature.

The valve-in-head engine that has powered millions of Chevrolets is continued without basic change.

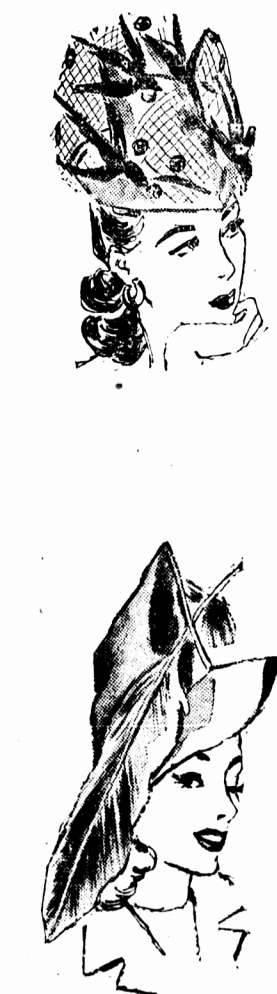

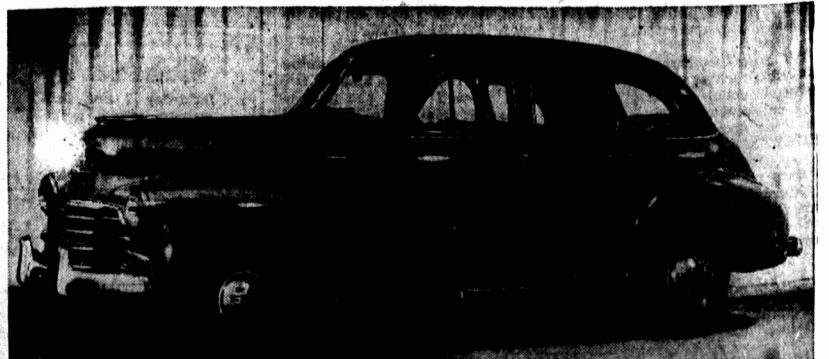
