PENITENTIARY WELL MANAGED SAYS PREACHER

Rev. Neil Herman Refers To Recent Riot And Conditions Of Dorchester.

SACKVILLE, N. B., Jan. 19.—Speaking before a crowded congregation last evening in the Main St. Baptist Church, Rev. Neil Herman, of Halifax, during his sermon made the following remarks regarding the recent outbreak in the Maritime Penitentiary at Dorchester.

"The recent riots in our Canadian penitentiaries create opportunities for all sorts of rumors and give rise to nearly any kind of a criticism from those who have been hard hit by the avenging sword of the law.

The visits of wrath are poured upon the wardens and the other officers in charge of our prisons. The wardens always become the target as the captain of a crew of mutineers becomes the hated and maligned object of every sailor in irons.

Within the last two and a half years I have held two missions in Dorchester Penitentiary. I have been in every corner and crevice of that prison in Dorchester. I have examined the food. I have eaten part of the prison fare. If the food in Dorchester Penitentiary is not fresh, well cooked and wholesome, then my sense of taste must be ridiculously below the standard of ordinary mortals—and so far, I have never been judged either abnormal or subnormal.

If there is a man, who is an eligible judge of sanitation, and who will take the time to carefully examine the Maritime Penitentiary, and if he can find, in any part of that institution, anything that can be construed as "filth," he is the first man that I have met who ever ventured such a criticism. The first impression you receive at the penitentiary is that of cleanliness from top to bottom.

Talk about wardens and deputy wardens! If you can produce a superior type of man and officer than that found in Warden G. T. Goad, you can't find him in Canada. You don't need to scour the country for evidence along that line. You can get your witnesses from the inside and that is the side that doesn't lie.

As for the other officers—if they were not fit, they wouldn't last twenty-four hours under disciplinarians like Warden Goad and Deputy Warden Cummings. It is an easy matter for the ordinary layman looking on, to say how the job should be done. It is like some fellows thinking they can preach. It is natural for the fellow who is "pinched" to hurl his curses and his lead pipes at the men in charge of the prison walls and iron bars. In these days of insurrection and riot we don't want to bite the hand of the law; if we do, the day is not far distant when the hand of bloody revolution will smite us to the dust."

Initial Steps To Regulate The Bus And Truck Services On A National Scale—Dominion Unemployment Relief To Be Continued As At Present.

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—Extension of the present unemployment relief service along one or two lines, dictated by humanitarian considerations and at the same time a tightening up to eliminate abuses and effect possible economies may result from the conference of Dominion and Provincial Governments which ended here last night. A long list of resolutions adopted by the conference covered relief administration, bus and truck regulation, company law and taxation.

Marked achievement was made in the three days parley. Unanimous resolutions were passed on many subjects which both Dominion and Provincial delegates alike said would bring far-reaching beneficial results. Only on relative jurisdiction over insurance companies and social and unemployment insurance were there no resolutions passed. On these subjects, Quebec and Ontario were not inclined to give the Dominion the degree of authority it desired. Most of the provinces favored Dominion authority.

Medical attention for persons receiving direct relief was one of the humanitarian aspects of relief considered. The conference decided a limited expenditure of money for medical attention should be made legitimate as part of the relief service.

The problem of the youth leaving school or college and finding himself without work was also given careful study. No method of dealing with this problem was settled but the conference recommended the Dominion Director of Relief should take it up with the proper provincial authorities with a view to evolving some means of aiding young men of this class.

With a view to the prevention of abuses a committee of the conference considered appointment of addition investigators but decided this would be justified only on the grounds of sound administration and economy.

If such investigators were appointed the cost should be divided between the Dominion and the Provinces. It was also decided Dominion and Provincial officials should confer and draw up a uniform set of resolutions governing relief distribution to have effect throughout Canada.

Annual Meeting Trinity United Church At Summerside

There was a very large attendance of members at the annual congregational meeting of Trinity United Church, Summerside on Wednesday evening.

All reports were most encouraging and indicated increased activities in all branch of church work. There was an increase in membership showing 38 new members. There are now 258 families and 924 persons under pastoral oversight. The Board of Stewards report contributions in excess of last year, all bills paid and a slight surplus. Missionary gifts totalled over \$3000. The Sunday School showed an increase. Messrs George Sheen, Willis Warren, J. R. McPherson and W. W. Muttart were elected to the Board of Stewards and Mr. C. W. Ramsay to the vacancy on the Trustee Board caused by the death of J. D. Goss. The following resolution moved by Mr. A. S. McKay, seconded by W. J. Lidstone and unanimously adopted was placed on record: Resolved that, we the members of Trinity United Church Congregation, Summerside, at our annual meeting held on January 18, 1933 place on record our sincere appreciation of the labours of our minister, Rev. L. B. Campbell, B.A. since he has had charge of our congregation.

Our desire is that his earnest faithful preaching, his kindly services as pastor may tend to a better life on our part and for better conditions morally, socially and spiritually in our community.—S
