**P.E.I. Drama Festival**

The Finals in the first Province-wide Drama Festival organized by the Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes are being staged this week at Cornwall, with the following Institute groups competing: York, North Milton and Cornwall, Mrs. Francis Hall Trainer and Mr. Barry Bugden, Charlottetown, will adjudicate.

Last week, semi-finals were held at York, with two Cornwall groups and Meadowbank playing. J.A. Lawson and Mrs. Arthur Henry, Charlottetown were the Adjudicators.

The idea of a Prince Edward Island Drama Festival grew out of a District Convention Drama Festival organized last year by a group comprising Kelvin Grove, Springfield, Irishtown, Margate, Long River and Springbrook Institutes. Previously at their District Convention in July, Mrs. Frances Hall Trainer, having been asked to speak on Drama Festival work gave helpful information on organization and scoring, and a number of one-act plays for reading. Later, Mrs. Trainer, and the Venerable Arch-Deacon Harrison, Summerside were the adjudicators for the finals in the Festival.

Out of this experiment grew the larger idea of a Provincial Drama Festival, and the executive of the P.E.I. Women's Institutes appointed from its members the following committee to draw up rules and regulations to govern such a Festival: Chairman, Mrs. Harold Laird, Kelvin Grove, Secretary, Treasurer, Mrs. Ray MacLeod, Graham's Road and Mrs. William Agnew, Cardigan.

Interest in the Festival this year was encouraging, but for a number of reasons, the principal one being the more than usual amount of sickness in rural areas during the winter and early spring, many Institutes which entered the competition were forced to withdraw later. It is felt, however, that a milestone has been reached in dramatic art, regardless of a small beginning. Interest is developing, and the value of dramatic art, especially in rural areas cannot be over-estimated.

With the competition open to any rural or small town group, it is hoped that the Prince Edward Island Drama Festival will be, from now on, an annual event, fraught with such a growing enthusiasm, and so benefitting from the constructive criticism of our adjudicators, that each succeeding year will see a bigger and better Festival.

Mrs. Trainer, who will again be adjudicating the finals this year, and Mr. J.A. Lawson, managing director of the Little Theatre Guild of Charlottetown, have the following remarks to make concerning the Drama Festival, sponsored by the Women's Institutes:

Mrs. Trainer — It is interesting to note the progress made in the last two years by the Women's Institutes in promoting the Dramatic Art. I am looking forward to adjudicating the entries in the final festival to be held at Cornwall this week and seeing the plays which I am sure will be equally as good or better than those which competed last year. As one who has always been interested in the amateur theatre, I am pleased that the Women's Institutes are doing so much to promote dramatic art in the rural communities. It is to be hoped that the number of groups, taking part in the festivals will increase each year and that some day, one of them may be chosen to represent Prince Edward Island in the Dominion Drama Festival. In the meantime, the producing of plays should prove of inestimable value to the various communities and well worth the efforts expended. I wish the Women's Institutes every success for the future in promoting interest in the amateur theatre.

Mr. Lawson, Th. Women's Institutes, are to be commended for recognizing the value of the Amateur Theatre in rural communities and for promoting the production of plays and festivals in rural Prince Edward Island.

It is to be hoped and expected, that their efforts will develop and expand, and that from among the rural dramatic groups, some may be entered in the sub-regional festivals which it is expected will be revived in Prince Edward Island next year.

At the Dominion Drama Festival this year, the creation of a National Theatre for Canada was seriously considered. If and when such a theatre comes into being, it will provide a valuable stepping-stone for any of our talented young people who desire a theatrical career. Prince Edward Island, in the past, has produced many leaders in other walks of life. Given an opportunity, there is no reason why she should not produce stars of the screen and stage as well.

I wish the Women's Institutes the best of luck in their festivals, which I am sure are proving of inestimable benefit to the communities they serve.
