

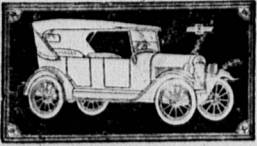

THAT CAR OF YOURS

This is a series of articles pertaining to maintenance and repair of your Automobile. We will be glad to answer through this column, questions regarding your car or its mechanism.

SIGNALLING

A signal in time will often avert a serious accident. This article, if studied a short time will assist you in the proper and practical method of signalling.

When making a right hand turn give NO signal. When coming to a stop extend the left arm out and upward and at the same time sound the horn.

When pulling in to the right of a country road to stop, blow the horn, pull in to the right, extend the left arm out and forward.

Always sound the horn when passing a vehicle going in the same direction, but never make a left hand turn if both vehicles arrive at the intersection at the same time or you will have to cut the corner to turn as you will be too far over towards the centre of the road to make the proper and lawful left hand turn.

Obey police officers' signals immediately. Ques. — Will a bent front axle wear out the front tires? C. D. Tignish.

Ans. Not if the wheels have been lined up after the axle is bent, but it must be done immediately after the axle is bent.

Former Charlottetonian Builds Speed Boat in Baltimore

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 14.—Dr. John P. Bell is a dentist. He works all day with drills, plates and pliers. But night works a change in him. He turns shipbuilder.

For the last twelve months Dr. Bell averaged five nights a week working on a speedboat. Every detail, including the assembling of the engine, is a result of his efforts. Saturday, Aug. 8, he put on the finishing touches. Yesterday (Aug. 12) he launched the craft.

Dentistry, he says, is his vocation, and shipbuilding his avocation. His finished product is mute testimony that he brings to his evening pastime all the delicate skill required in his vocation. The boat is 26 feet long. From bow to stern the sides are as smooth almost as an enamelled tooth.

The hull is built of mahogany. But the engine is the pride of the builder's life. It is an aerial marine engine, 100 horsepower, and designed with four cylinders.

Dr. Bell is able to make 35 miles an hour with the red sea-gull. He has named it Margaret. The dentist's nocturnal role is strikingly different from his day-time work, and yet strangely similar.

His white uniform is doffed for greasy overalls; the long, lean pliers are traded for the stouter ones suitable for spark-plug and water pipe adjustments; the gear of the dentist's electric drill is replaced in the shipbuilder's drill for the riveting. Dr. Bell estimated he put 8,000 rivets and screws in his boat.

Almost every evening after work Dr. Bell drove in his automobile from his North Charles street offices to the little shack on Franklin road, where his brain-child was developing into a fast bay craft. He bought his first instalment of mahogany last August 22. Since then he has taken lumber, metal work and tools on nearly every visit to the shack.

The speed boat is not the first craft Dr. Bell has built, but it is the largest and best. He was born in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, Canada.

"When I was fifteen years old," he said today to the Guardian, "I put two planks together and hoisted a sail bag for a sail. Between the planks I nailed a biscuit box to sit on. I also made two oars from barrel staves nailed to broom handles. With this improvised sailboat I took many trips about the Northumberland Straits and the Lawrence. Later I built a fore-and-aft 'torpedo boat' with a two-cylinder engine. This finally was sold to the Canadian government, to carry oil to lighthouses, so I guess it must have been put together pretty well."

Dr. Bell came to Baltimore twelve years ago. He was graduated from the University of Maryland School of Dentistry. He is 31 years old.

REAM OF 1,000 SHEETS PAPER TRADE CHANGE London.—The terms "ream" and "quire" used as measures for the buying and selling of paper since the time of Caxton are to become obsolete.

An agreement arrived at between the Federation of Master Printers and the National Association of Wholesale Stationers, said to a Daily Mail reporter: The agreement also provides for the standardization of the sizes of paper so that instead of having nearly 40 the number will be reduced to 19, and the substitution of 1,000 sheets for the ream will secure the advantage of decimal calculations for the trade.

Russia Wants Credit

The Russian Minister to England, Rakovsky, has just returned from Russia with orders for British factories totalling seventy-five million dollars.



However, it appears that Russia wants credit on about three-quarters of the orders which are for agricultural machinery and textiles.

WEARING LAMPS ON ANKLES NOW

Ankles lamps have been given the official O. K. Paris women—some of them at any rate—have adopted them as part of their evening attire and what more is necessary to bring them into universal favor?

Any woman who has picked, stumbled and splashed her way over puddle-covered pavements at night after a rain or snow storm will be quick to appreciate the advantage of ankle lamps. They light the way at night and prevent a disaster.

The originator of the ankle lamp however, it is said, had in mind the comfort of women who ride in automobiles. They take the perils out of stepping on to the running board and from the car into a rut.

The ankle lights are not conspicuous as such. They are quite ornamental. They resemble the modish ankle bracelet introduced not so long ago by the precocious flappers, and are easily put in place. They have a wire base, and on opening on one side permits them to be slipped over the ankle in a second.

The bulb is not noticeable, for it is concealed under a visor, which in turn is camouflaged with ribbon or flowers buds. The ankle lights are obtainable in various colors, and it is necessary that one have several of them—one for each costume.

The light can be flashed on and off at will. An almost invisible wire runs upwards, usually terminating in the wearer's handbag or vanity case. A small button on the end is pressed when the light is needed, and likewise pressed when darkness is sufficient.

GIRL POILU.

A French girl who has masqueraded as a man since 1924—when she says, she accompanied a regiment to the police at Grenoble. In 1918 a young man giving his name as Marcel Rosso was engaged on a farm at Revel in the Isere department. He proved so useful that the farmer came to regard him as his own son, and with the intention of adopting him, made inquiries for the youth's birth certificate.

The inquiry failed, and the local police, becoming suspicious, interrogated the youth, after being closely questioned about his origin, broke down, and weeping bitterly, said, "I am not a man—I am a woman. My name is Suzanne Perrier. I was born at Charmecoles, in the Isere department, on September 21, 1894." She added that she had cut off her hair and dressed as a man in order to follow a regiment to the front in 1924.
