A MONUMENT to General Sir Hector Macdonald has just been placed at his grave in the Dean cemetery, Edinburgh. Erected in Dodington freestone, it rises to a height of thirty feet. It takes the form of an obelisk, supported by cannon balls. In front of this base stands a pedestal, terminating with an Ionic capital, bearing a bronze bust, white from each corner of the base hang festoons of laurel, carved in high relief. A list of thirteen of the most outstanding engagements in which the deceased took part is inscribed on the base, while the inscription on the pedestal is: "Major General Sir Hector Archibald Macdonald, K. C. B., D. S. O., A. D. C., L. L. D. Born 4th March, 1833. Died 25th March, 1903. The sculptor is W. Birnie Rhind, R. S. A."
