

GOOD ATTENDANCE SEE FAST RACING ON CLOSING DAY OF EXHIBITION

Two Good Classes of Horse Racing With Splendid Parade of Live Stock Cattle And Daring Feats By Flying Moors Featured The Closing Day At The Provincial Exhibition. Mac Aubrey And Allan A. Win The Classes. Fastest Time, 2.14. Lambert Todd Fails To Break Track Record. Monte Gerow Wins The Twenty Dollar Gold Piece For Most Number Of Points.

They got away nicely on the second trip down, Major S. out in front to the quarter in 33.1-4, half 1.07.3-4, three quarters in 1.41, on the turn to the stretch Mac Aubrey came with a burst and on a whipping drive won the heat from Major S. in 2.14.

The second heat was a repetition of the first to the three quarters, quarter in 33.1-2, half in 1.07, three quarters in 1.40.1-2 and then Jack Volo came in close and raced with win a hot race in 2.14.

In the third heat Jack Volo slipped out in front, Bud Hal slipping in the lead at the second turn and half in 1.07, the rest of the field stringing out in the rear, Mac Aubrey came up to lead at the three quarters in 1.40.3-4 and winning on a good margin in 2.15.

In the fourth heat the Aubrey horse stepped out in front and lead the whole route, quarter in 33.1-2, half, 1.07.1-2, three quarters in 1.40.1-2, and mile, 2.14.1-2.

An innovation this year is the presenting of special ribbons to the owners of the winning horses in each class. These are being specially designed and made up by the Dominion Regalia Co. of Toronto and will be forwarded to them in a few days.

Horsemen and visitors say that the racing in Charlottetown and at Fredericton the previous week was the best seen in years. Outside horsemen think it is also a good thing for future exhibitions that such a large proportion of the prize money went abroad. For years the P. E. Island horses seemed to outclass the visitors, this year the visitors did so well that it will them back again and bring large numbers with them.

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Findlander Found in Starving Condition

MIDDLETON, N.S., Sept. 30.—Starving to death in the midst of plenty, Edward Lindstrom, 32, a Finlander, was taken from an isolated barn near here, semi-conscious and speechless from lack of food. Lindstrom, a farm laborer out of work, told authorities that he had been for three weeks with nothing to eat but berries picked in the woods and washed down with water from a spring. He was found in a barn on an unoccupied farm when neighbors went to harvest the hay crop.

The man had been dismissed from his last employment and had been unable, so he said, to secure work, eventually growing too weak from lack of food to travel around. He declared that no one would give him food. There was no record of his having been turned away from any of the local farm houses, and how he could starve in a country where pauperism is practically unknown and hospitality a by-word, was a mystery to the authorities who placed the man under observation in the County Home.
