From the time the curtain rose on the first scene until it fell on the last, the audience were held thoroughly interested, and, at times, irresistibly spell-bound. ### SYNOPSIS OF SCENES.

Act I. The "George Washington"—A country tavern in Old Virginia—An impromptu wedding.

The scene of the play is laid in Old Virginia, and depicts pastoral scenery in vivid reality. The plot as it unfolds shows the carefully prepared mechanism of Ira Courtleigh, the clever, designing villain, and the equally clever thwartings of Horace Verner, the shrewd and delicate hero. Imogene Courtleigh, the heroine, impersonates the character of the well-bred, well-educated and correctly-determined lady.

Buck Tyson originally interpreted the character of the humorous and complacent gipsy tinker. He always rose to the occasion, and his native wit supported him eminently.

Nance Tyson effectively and good-naturedly interpreted the necessary character of a prudent, yet almost indulgent mother and the exceptionally conservative woman. On her holding the secret depended the denouement of the plot. This secret when disclosed showed how Horace Verner was the son of George Courtleigh, uncle of Ira Courtleigh, and how Ginger was Horace's sister.

Ginger was, in appearance and interpretation, the personification of the gipsy wail.

Dink Potts, the early companion of Horace Verner, excellently portrayed the character of the ardent and persistent lover and showed powers yet to be developed.

Squire Ripley, the proprietor of the "George Washington" country tavern was the actual embodiment of the practical and magnetic landlord.

Elmer Van Sittert gushingly enunciated the character of the pompous and self-satisfied Anglomaniac New Yorker; but his professed notion of chivalric adventure was effectively dissipated by his cowardice in attempting to prevent the vindication of honor.

Major Duffy, representing the Confederate veteran, and the winning candidate for civic honors, displayed the character of the hero confident in his own achievements, and the politician satisfied with his own fitness to serve the public.

Prudence Freeheart with due feminine modesty, yet resolutely firm determination, carefully prepared her schemes to entrap the wily Major.
