The paper was picked up in a bottle by surf men from Vermillion Life Station and reads "Sunday morning, to Hawgood Co., Cleveland, under please forward. The Henry S. Smith broke in two, opposite No. 5 Hatch about twelve miles east Marquette. We are having an awful time (signed) Oliver."

MONTREAL, June 4.—After the steamer Storstad was relieved of the load of coal here today it was seen that her stem was so badly twisted to starboard by the recent collision that it resembled a half circle. The condition of the stem of the boat seems to bear out Captain Andersson's story that it was impossible for him to keep the boat in the Empress gap and twisted her stem out of the hole. The Storstad is still in the possession of the bailiff.

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—Those sending money orders to England on the Empress will not lose them. The Government has decided that duplicates of orders will be copied and despatched to London where they will be paid the same as the original.

MONTREAL, Jan. 2.—The C. P. R. offices announced today that the matter of raising the Empress will not be decided until Lloyds are heard from. The C. P. R. will have nothing to do with the project for raising her until orders are received from Lloyds either for or against the plan.
