One secret of winter eggs lies in early hatching. Chicks hatched not later than mid or late April will mature in time to lay eggs in the fall.

POULTRY KEEPING SIMPLIFIED

Poultry keeping has been wonderfully simplified in the past few years. Any woman who raised chickens a decade ago will testify. In the old days it was supposed that a warm light house was necessary if the hens were to lay in winter.

Now it is a common practice among poultry-women to raise their chickens entirely on dry washes in addition to cracked grain. The dry washes which may be made up at home or purchased ready mixed is kept in a hopper where the chicks can have access to it at all times and the same plan is followed with laying hens.

FEEDING CALF.

DAIRY (continued)
A cow's ability to produce milk is hereditary. First, her inherent stimulus is supplied by her dairy breeding; second, her capacity to eat and digest food. A profitable producer must have both to a marked degree.

GREASE CURES TEAT WARTS.

It is not delightful to work a thoroughly broken well matched team? By matched team, for this purpose, is meant, a pair nearly or quite equal in pulling power and ambition. If they are the same color and markings so much the better.
