WASHINGTON, June 2.—In record breaking time unequalled on Capitol Hill during war days, Congressional conferees tonight completed the \$1,000,000,000 revenue bill.
The representatives of the Senate and House reached a complete agreement in 13½ hours on the measure carrying the new taxes to balance the Government budget for next year.
Through the day, in shirt sleeves, they worked while their Senatorial colleagues struggled over the major item of the economy bill which is to aid the budget balancing programme—a 10 percent cut in pay for all government workers.

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BILL WOULD PROHIBIT SMALL LOBSTERS

Crustacea Imported Into United States Must Be 10 1-2 Inches In Length.

MAY IGNORE FREE STATE AT CONFERENCE

Dominions Sec'y. Intimates That Great Britain Might Not Enter Into Any Negotiations With Dail At Ottawa.

LONDON, June 2.—J. H. Thomas, Dominions Secretary, today told the House of Commons the British Government had entered into no discussion with the Irish Free State in preparation for the Ottawa Imperial Economic Conference next month. The Government, Mr. Thomas said, took the attitude that the Free State has "repudiated the Anglo-Irish agreement" by passage through the Dail Eireann of President Eamon De Valera's bill to abolish the parliamentary oath of allegiance to the King.

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JAP PREMIER MAKES PLEA

Asks Diet's Support Of His Gov'ts. Foreign Policies.

NEW YORK, June 3. (Friday)—A plea by Premier Makoto Saito of Japan for the Japanese Diet's support of his government's foreign policies was made public by the Japanese Consulate-General here.
In his speech, delivered in the House of Peers today, the Premier likewise appealed to the "good sense and discernment of our people not to be misled" by rumors of a possible war with Soviet Russia.
"The future of our foreign relations," he said, "depends upon the support of the Diet."

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500,000 FACE STARVATION IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, June 2.—Half a million Chicagoans face starvation unless federal aid is procured, a group of bankers and civic leaders told President Hoover by telephone today.
The action was taken after the Illinois Emergency Relief Commission announced that dwindling finances will force the closing of the city's relief stations after Saturday night.
Wilfred S. Reynolds, executive secretary of the commission, said it has been feeding 111,000 families, or 500,000 persons, at \$23 a month and that these persons will have no other place to obtain food. Eighty-three business and civic leaders have been summoned to a conference tomorrow.
If a market, at present unexpected, could be found for \$6,500,000 in tax anticipation warrants, relief work could be continued until August 1, said Reynolds.
Mayor Anton J. Cermak, declared later in the day that federal aid would be necessary after August 1, even if the tax warrants were sold.

MENACE OF DRUG TRAFFIC IS STRESSED

At Yesterday's Session Of The Presbyterian General Assembly In Convention At London, Ont.

LONDON, Ont., June 2.—The Presbyterian Record, official publication of the church, had a deficit of \$1,054 for the past year. This was shown in the annual report presented this afternoon at the General Assembly.
"The menace of the drug traffic in Canada was stressed by Dr. H. A. Vining, secretary of the Social Service Council of Canada. Drug peddlers were increasing in Canada and the United States, he said. Factories in Europe produced twenty times as much dope as the medical profession of the world could use. It was estimated there were 1,500,000 addicts in United States, the most between the ages of 16 and 25.

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MANY IN THE KING'S HONOR LIST THIS YR.

Forty Knighthoods Bestowed By His Majesty—Prince Of Wales And Duke Of York Figure In Honors Awarded.

LONDON, June 2. (Canadian Press Cable)—The Prince of Wales and the Duke of York figure in the honors list issued tonight on the eve of His Majesty's 67th birthday anniversary.
The Prince of Wales is appointed honorary commodore in chief; the Duke of York is promoted to Rear-Admiral and also promoted Major-General and Vice-Marshal in the Royal Navy, Army and Air Force respectively.
In his earlier years the Duke of York actively served in the Royal Air Force, but his interest in social welfare and other duties which devolved upon him, especially in the long absences from England of the Prince of Wales, caused him to relinquish his active identity with the junior service.
Two of the most interesting items of the list, which as a whole contains few surprises, are the conferment of Knighthoods on the famous Australian airman, Commodore Charles Kingsford-Smith, and Robert Davis, inventor of the life saving device for submarines which saved several lives when the British submarine Posidon sank in Chinese waters last year.

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FIVE TRAPPED ON ISLAND BY FLOOD WATERS

CALGARY, June 2. (By the Canadian Press)—Turbulent flood waters of two rivers and a dozen creeks tonight threatened the lives of five persons and spread damage in Calgary, High River and Okotoks as well as flooding farm and ranch over a wide stretch of territory west and southwest of Calgary.
Trapped on a small island in the swollen waters of Sheep Creek, near the oil town of Okotoks, 35 miles south of Calgary, were two policemen who went to the rescue of three sons of a sheep rancher who had become marooned by the quick rising floods 10 hours earlier.
Denying a despatch from Okotoks that the rescue of the shepherds had been effected, Corporal G. D. McWilliams, commanding officer of the Okotoks detachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, tonight said the five were still marooned. The stranded police officers, from the R. C. M. P. headquarters at Calgary, were Constables Plummer and Dick, and the three stranded shepherds were Thomas, 20, Albert, 21, and Charles 19, sons of Thomas L. Sandeman, sheep rancher living eight miles west of Okotoks.

HURRICANE KILLS EIGHTY

LONDON, June 2.—(A.P.)—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Bucharest said tonight that 80 persons had been killed and the same number injured in a hurricane at Ismail, Roumania. Many buildings were wrecked, the dispatch said, describing the damage as enormous.

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Unchanged In His Opposition Re Insurance

LONDON, Ont., June 2. (By the Canadian Press)—Premier R. B. Bennett is unchanged in his opposition to non-contributory unemployment insurance and to modification of section 98 of the criminal code, it was said tonight by members of the London and district unemployed association who interviewed the Prime Minister when he was in the city yesterday.
Delegates who had protested recent deportations stated Premier Bennett expressed to them his satisfaction with the ejection of persons deemed undesirable under the law as it stands at present.

Collies Save Girl's Life

BIGWOOD, Ont., June 2.—(By the Canadian Press)—Two collie dogs, Boule and Prince, are heroes today. When Miss Loretta Page 22 year old Rutter schoolteacher leaped from a second storey window in the home of Ernest Gauthier with her clothing in flames, the dogs saved her from injuries which might have been fatal.
As Miss Page struck the ground, Boule and Prince rolled her about, scratching out flames with their paws, never stopping until Miss Page's clothing was entirely extinguished. Boule whined occasionally, for his paws were badly burned, but he never stopped until the school teacher assured him she was all right.
"The dogs saved me," she said, "for my clothing was all in flames."

Delegates To The Ottawa Parley Are Announced
